Our Public Schools



Each year hundreds of boys and girls take advantage of our modern school system. Some are just beginning their school days, while others are completing their education.

The present Jackson Public School System was founded in 1906. The State Department of Education, in every annual inspection since 1906, has placed Jackson High School on the list of approved first class high schools.

The High School building was erected in 1920 at a cost of \$125,000 and in 1928, at a cost of \$45,000 a gymnasium and extra classrooms were added.

In 1939 a stadium, which will seat 2000 people, and an elementary school, which is one of the finest in the state, were erected. The grade school building has an auditorium with a seating capacity of 614 which is modern in every respect. It is equipped with border lights, foot lights, movie projector, public address system, and scenery.

Our public school system added another new building in 1952, the Music Arts Building located just east of the grade school. Our schools with their buildings, grounds, and equipment have been valued at nearly \$1,000,000. It is in these fine surroundings that the boys and girls of Jackson are trained for tomorrow.

In 1951 the kindergarten was added to our school system and the eighth grade was moved to the high school building. In 1952 our school changed to the six-six plan with both the seventh and eighth grades in the high school building. Our high school is a AAA school and is an approved member of the North Central Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges.

On March 12, a \$275,000 bond issue was approved by the voters for the purpose of adding new classrooms, and a new gym.

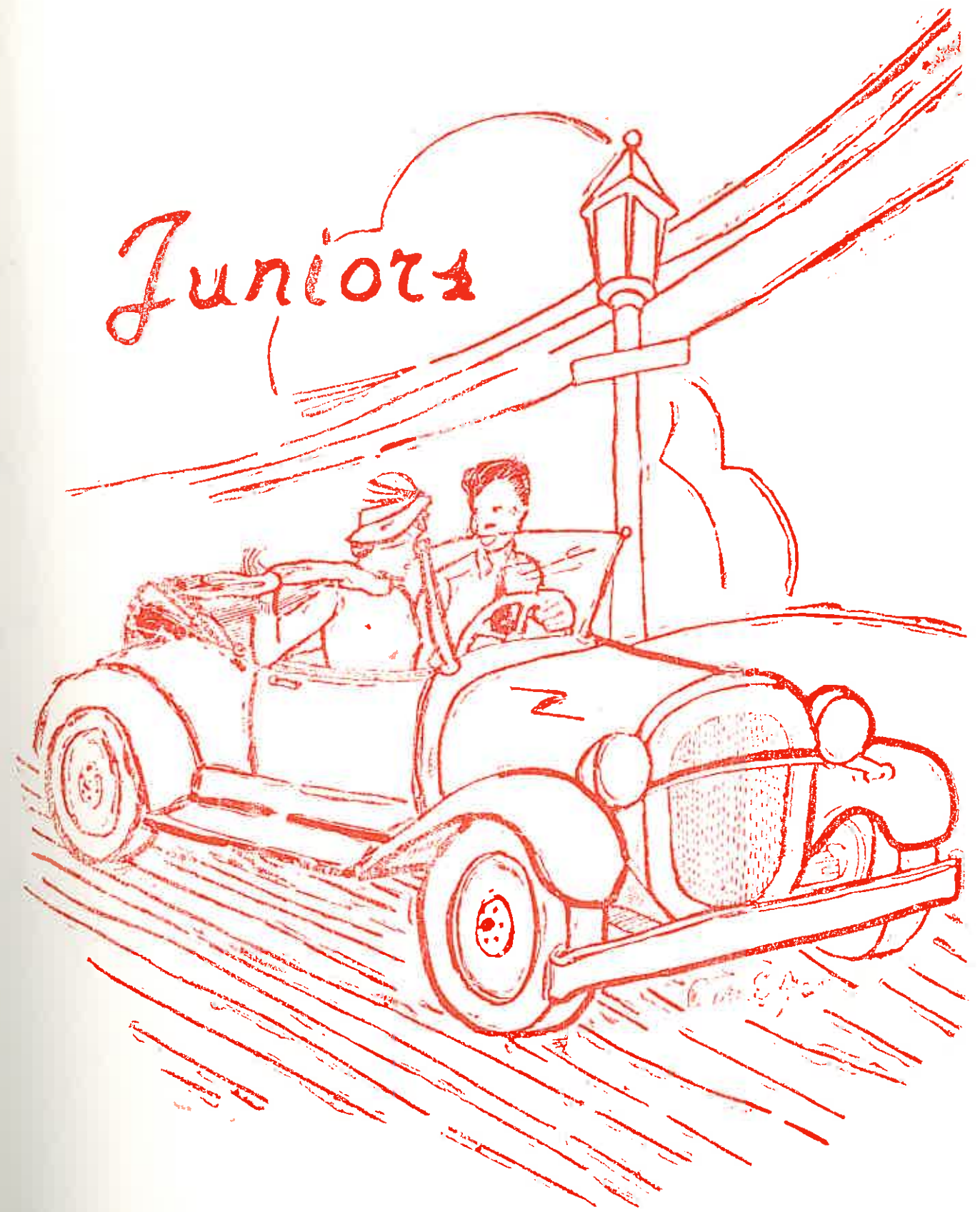

"Students of Jackson High School, welcome your Queen."

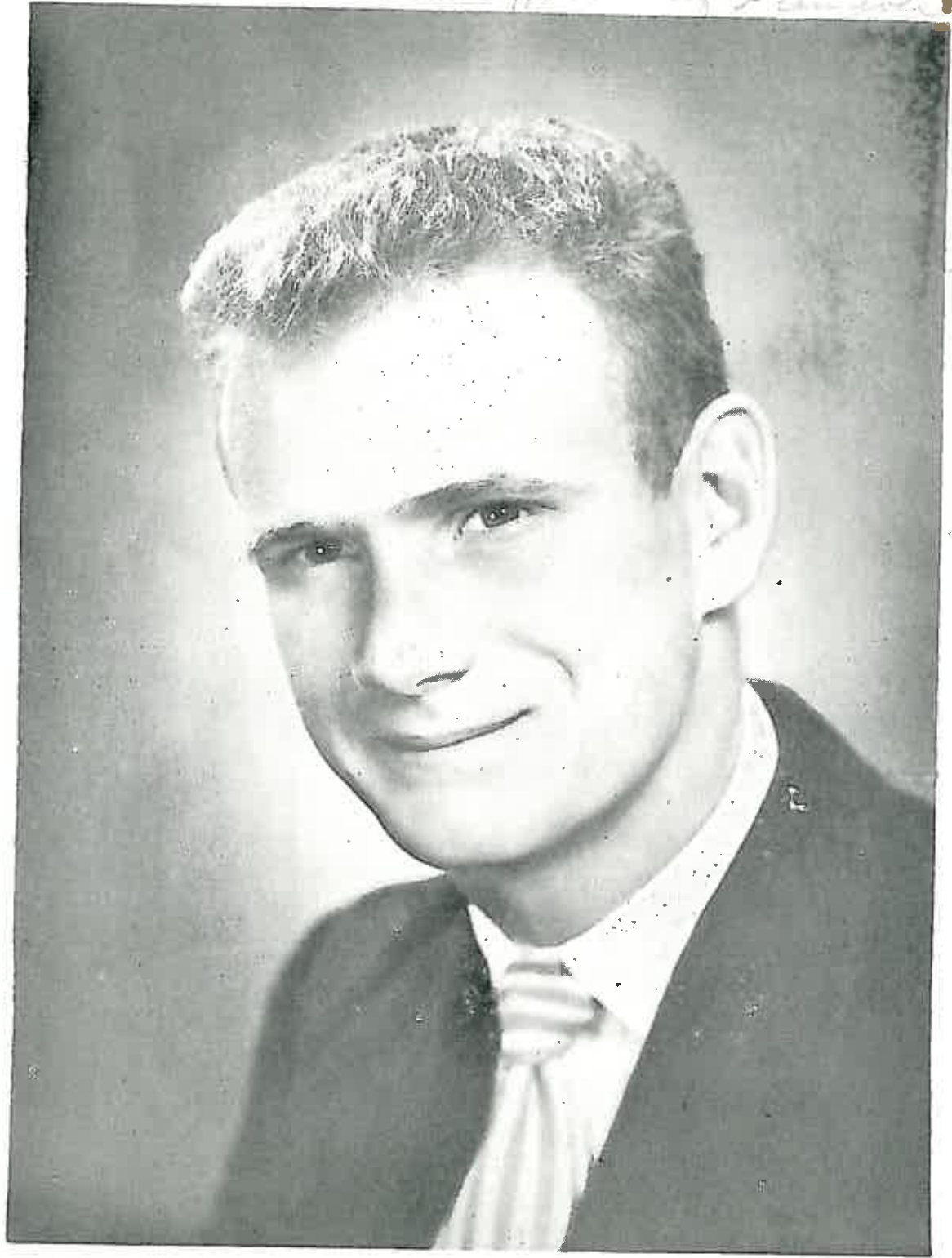

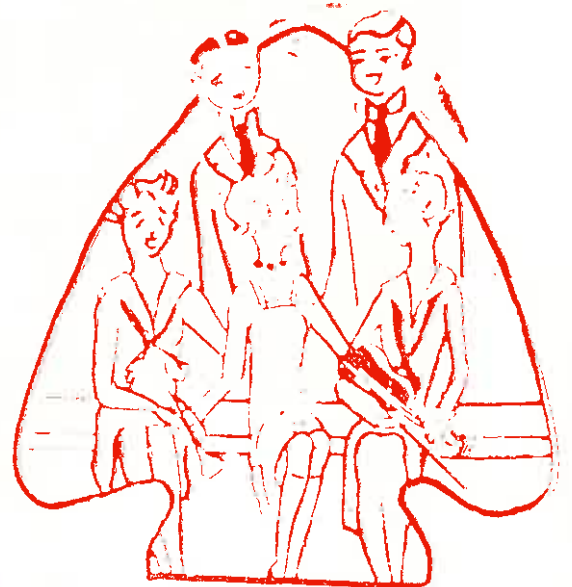
Entertainment at the intermission was furnished by the F. F. A. and the Spanish Club, and helped to make this dance a huge success.

The 1952-53 season opened with the Marching Band of 72 providing entertainment at the football games. For the opening game with Illmo-Fornfelt on Sept. 12 and before all other games the band spelled out 'Hi' in script, formed a pennant, a tepee, an Indian Arrowhead with the opponents school letter centered, and ended with a Block I, singing 'Hail to the Red and Black.'

On Sept. 26 the band presented 'The Kick-off' for the East Prairie game. After formations wishing the coaches and team good luck, the figure of a football player and a football was formed and animated by kicking the football over the goal posts.

For the Charleston game on Oct. 3, the band presented 'The Whiffenpoof', a pageant based on the popular song of the same title. 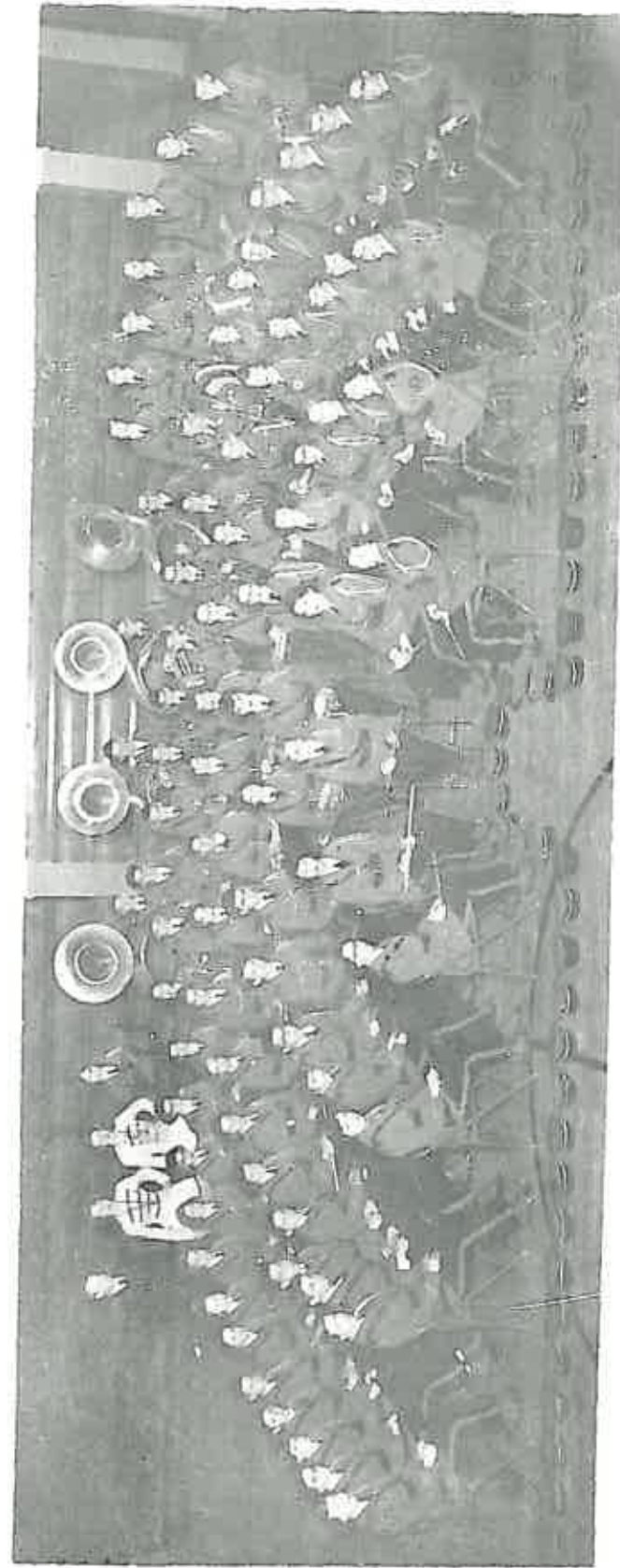
For the Caruthersville game on Oct. 31 the band put on a Western Show depicting a prospector's trip from Alabama to the gold fields.

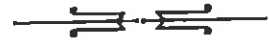
The first thing the girls' chorus did was to sing carols at the grade school for Christmas. A variety of carols were sung which the children seemed to enjoy.

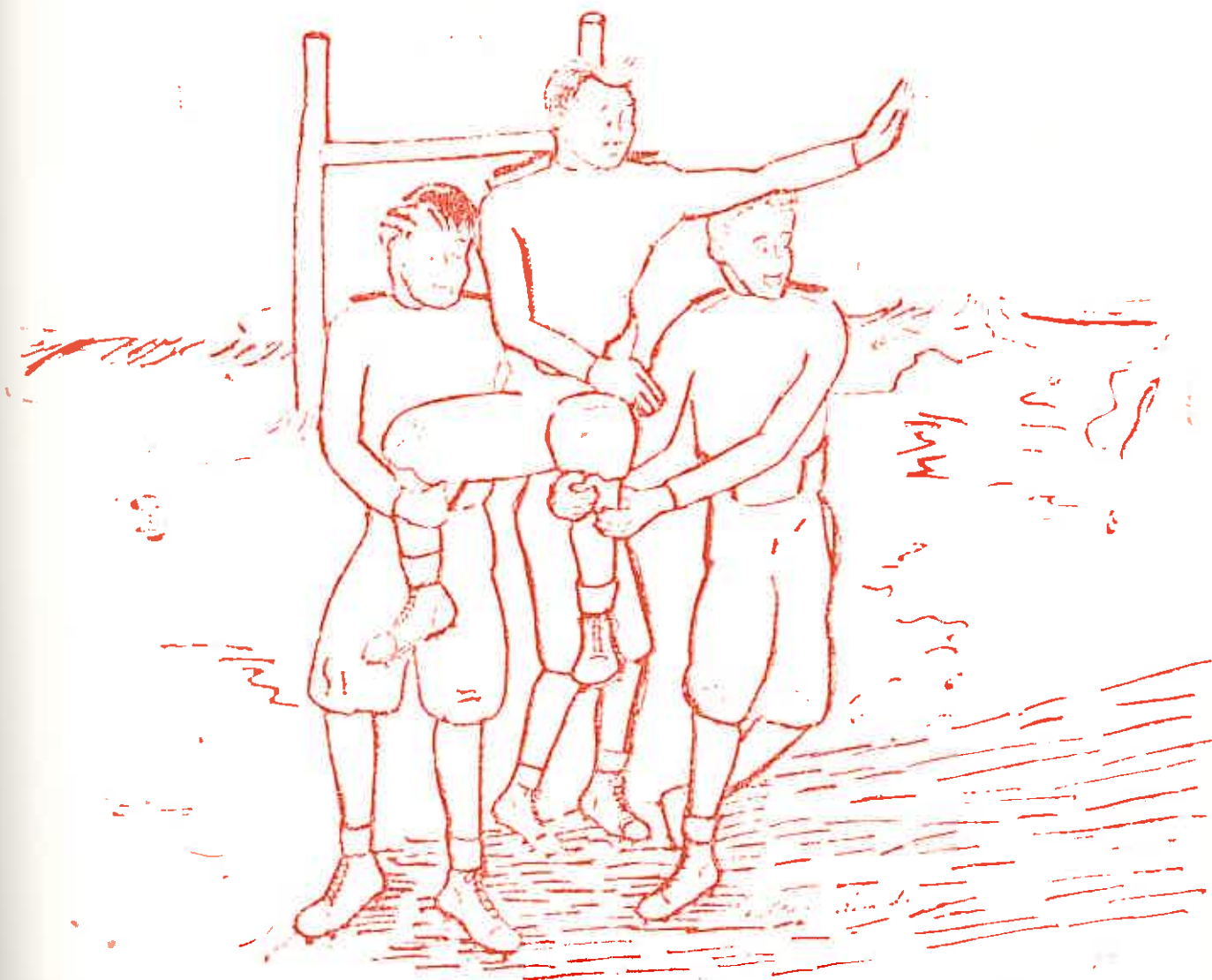

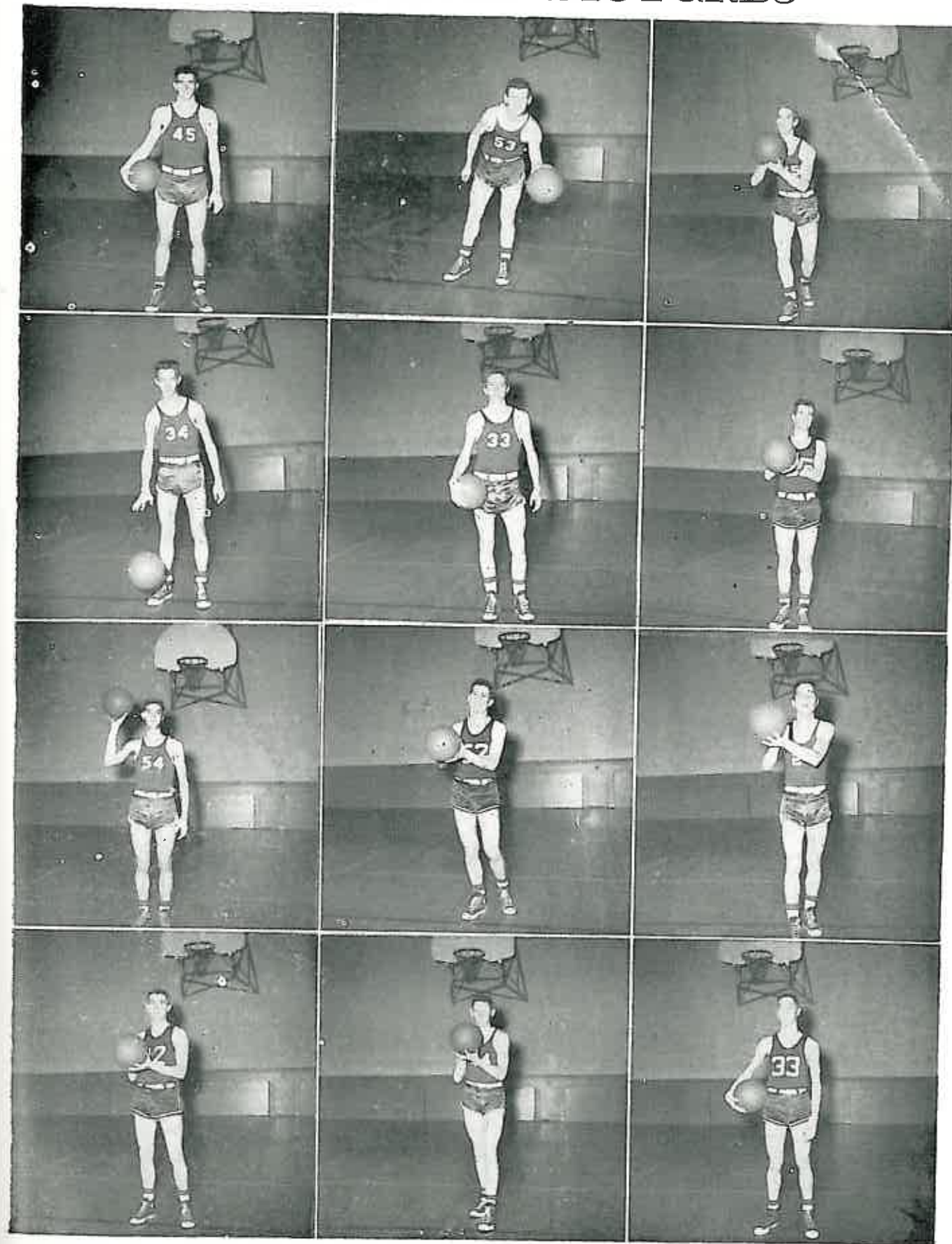

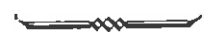
