OUR PUBLIC SCHOOLS

Our present Jackson Public School System was founded in 1906. After annual inspection, the State Department of Education has placed Jackson High School on the list of approved first class high schools.

The present high school building was constructed in 1920 at a cost of \$125,000. Extra classrooms and a gymnasium were added to the building in 1928 at a cost of \$45,000. The building contains 36 rooms and a cafeteria which daily feeds more than 420 children from the grade school and high school.

The grade school building, one of the finest in the state, was erected in 1939. It contains a spacious auditorium where many gatherings, as well as our assemblies, are held. A stadium was also constructed in 1939 which seats 2000 people.

Jackson High School is one of the best equipped and best operated schools in Southeast Missouri. It belongs to the highest accrediting agency of high schools and colleges in the North Central States.

The value of the buildings, grounds, and equipment is estimated at a cost of \$325,000.

Missouri requirements for graduation are seventeen credits; eleven are designated and six units are left to the choice of the student.

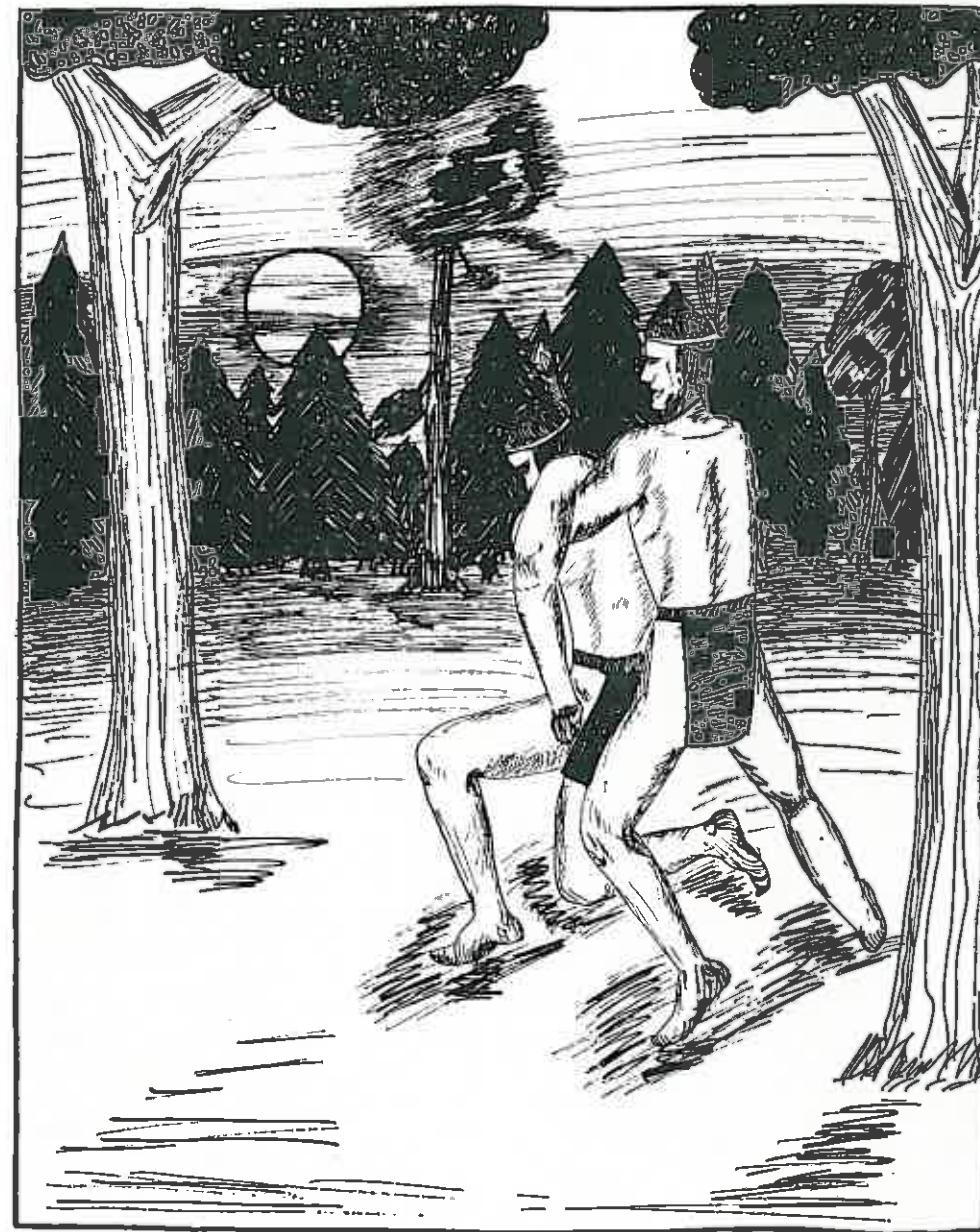
SOPHOMORE CLASS PLAY

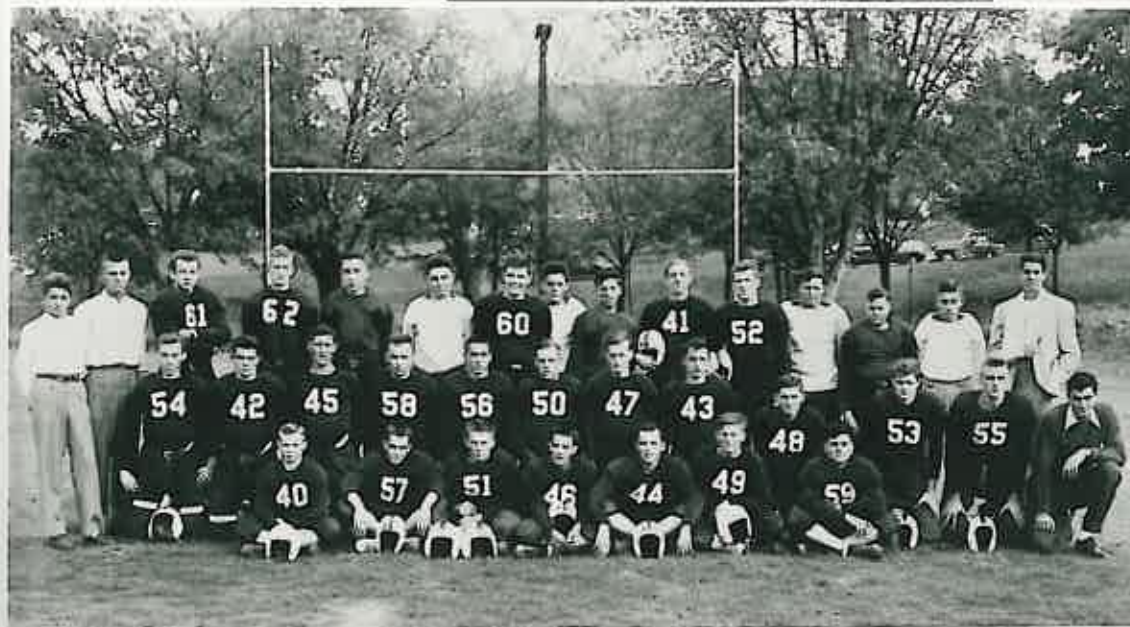
