Our School System

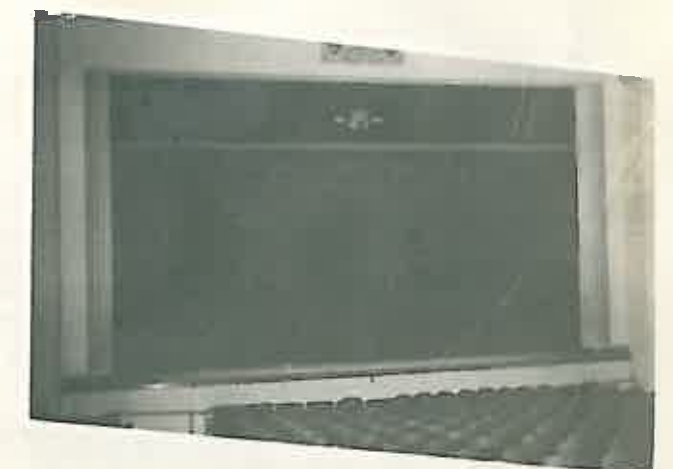
The present Jackson Public School System was founded in 1906. The State Department of Education, in its annual inspection since 1906, has placed Jackson High School on the list of approved first class high schools.

The High School building was erected in 1920 at a cost of \$125,000 and in 1928, at a cost of \$45,000 a gymnasium and extra classrooms were added.

In 1939 a stadium, which will seat 2000 people, and an elementary school, which is one of the finest in the state, was erected. The grade school building has an auditorium, having a seating capacity for 614 persons, modern in every respect, equipped with border lights, foot lights, movie projector, public address system, and scenery.

Jackson High School is considered to be one of the best equipped and operated schools in Southeast Missouri. It belongs to the highest accrediting agency of high schools and colleges in the North Central States.

The value of the buildings, grounds and equipment is conservatively estimated at \$325,000.

Because of the war situation, several boys of Jackson High School have been forced to discontinue their school work, while a number of others will enter the Armed Forces soon after graduation.

In November the Navy V-5 examinations were given in Jackson High School. Twelve Seniors took this examination. Eleven of the twelve passed and were sent to St. Louis for a physical checkup and also further examinations. Richard Cotner, Elwood Hitt, Bob Mecklin, and Buster Meehan passed all the examinations, were sworn in and ordered to report the first of July.

In January five boys tried to get into the radar program but all failed to pass the necessary examinations.

On March 15 the Army and Navy V-12 examinations were given in Jackson High School. Eleven Seniors took the tests and all chose the Navy but as yet no results have been heard.

Linus Crader was inducted into the Army in November and at present he is stationed at Camp Wolters, Tex.

Robert Bryce Goodwin was inducted into the Army Air Forces on February 21. At present he is stationed at Fort Bliss, Texas.

Willie Chapman, Johnny Gockel, Bob Henderson, and Bryce March have been sworn into the Navy and are subject to call at the close of school.

We are proud of the fact that Jackson High School is so well represented in Uncle Sam's Fighting Forces. Boys, we wish you the best of luck and we sincerely hope that you can soon return with Victory.

STUDENT COUNCIL

For the first time in several years the student body has formally assisted in governing Jackson High School. The faculty chose four members from each class as candidates for election to the Student Council. Each class voted for two of the four candidates submitted to them. The members chosen were Adelle Illers and Bryce March, Seniors; Aletha Grant and Roland Strickert, Juniors; Elden Selves and Jackie Morton, Sophomores; Edith Seabaugh and Billy Tucker, Freshmen.

On October 4th, they had their first meeting at which time officers were elected. Adelle Illers was elected president, Aletha Grant, vice-president; Jackie Morton, secretary; and Elden Selves, treasurer. On October 5th, a committee composed of Bryce March, Elden Selves, and Jackie Morton was named to draw up the constitution and by laws for the Council. On November the fourth the Constitutional banquet was held and all members accepted it by their signatures.

During the year this organization sponsored many useful and worthwhile projects. It was responsible for the selection and making of a J. H. S. flag, for the "Faculty Take Off" assembly, the Thanksgiving and Christmas Assemblies, and for a number of pep assemblies.

It also sponsored two dances—one after the Charleston football game and one Leap Year Dance.

During the last part of November the council was responsible for the beginning of the Jackson Recreational project by making and conducting a questionnaire in the schools and factories, and by appointing members of the student body to represent the school on the recreation council.

Another successful project was Student Government Day held on April twelfth.

We appreciate the many activities of value and interest and the hard work that this group has done during the year.

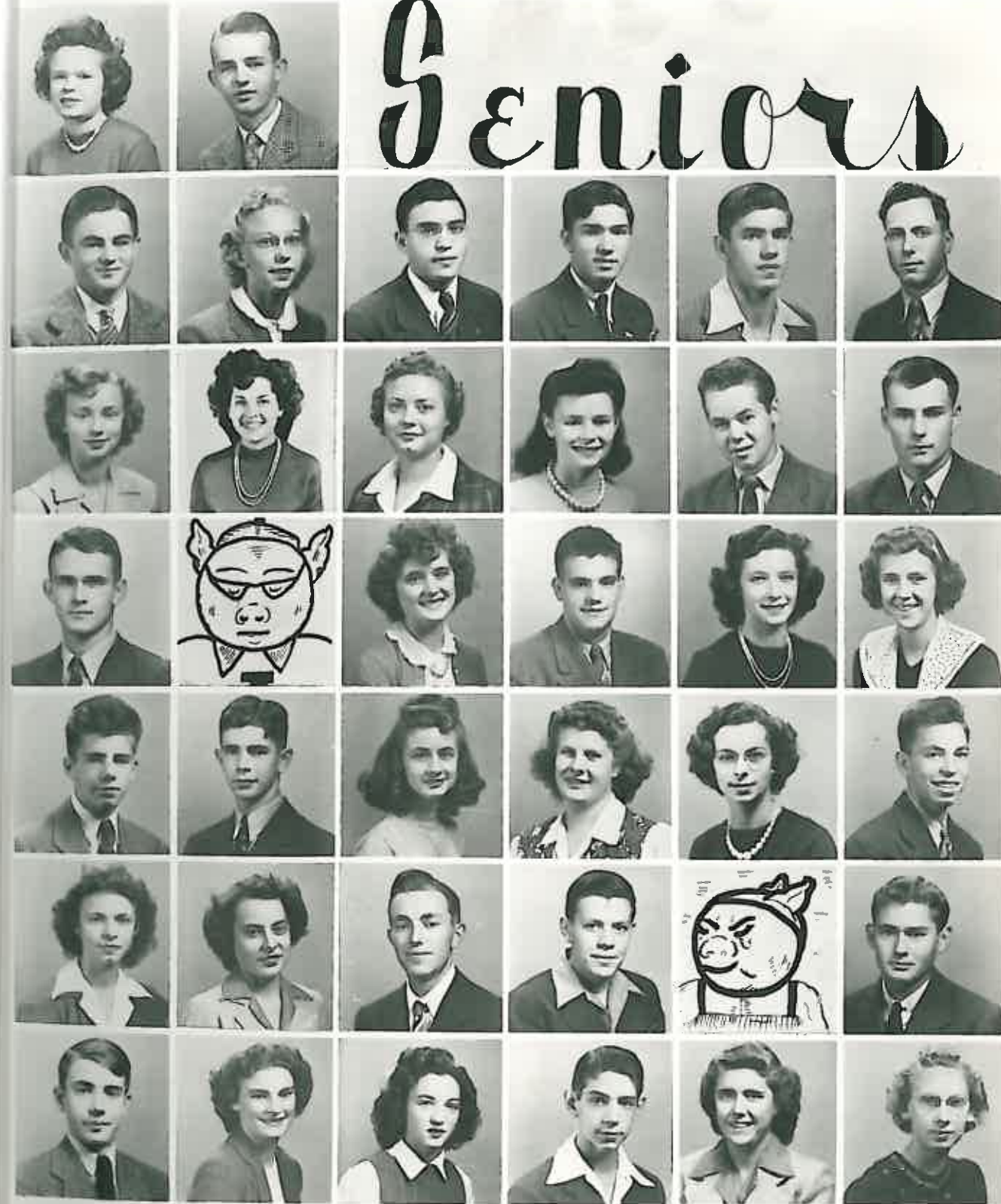

"Elmer" and "The Red Lamp" were the plays presented under the direction of Mr. Marvin Wilkening. Glen Wilson and Kelly Blackman were the managers of the football and basketball squads. Judy Knox was elected Carnival Queen and Robert Bryce Goodwin was her manager. This was the first time this honor had ever come to a Freshman candidate. Even as Freshman our class distinguished itself as a progressive organization.

The most coveted honors, Silver Arrow Queen and Big Chief, went to Shirley Mae Smith and Bud Hager. Their attendants were Adelle Rose Illers, Alice Faye Mason, Lillian Stalter, Bryce March, Glenn Edward Wilson and Lynn Wilkening. One of the new changes in Government which we have seen brought about is the Student Council. Our representatives were Adelle Rose Illers, later elected president and Bryce March. We are sure some of Senior athletes will be missed including the managers, Ray Miller and Harold Illers. A trip to Washington, D. C. was planned our freshman year; but the Pilgrimage being impossible, due to war activities and the great number of our group entering the armed forces. Our class is presenting an electric scoreboard to be placed in the gymnasium. Our high school life came to a climax with the Senior Play, Senior dance, Junior-Senior prom, baccalaureate service and commencement when 78 Seniors received their diplomas.

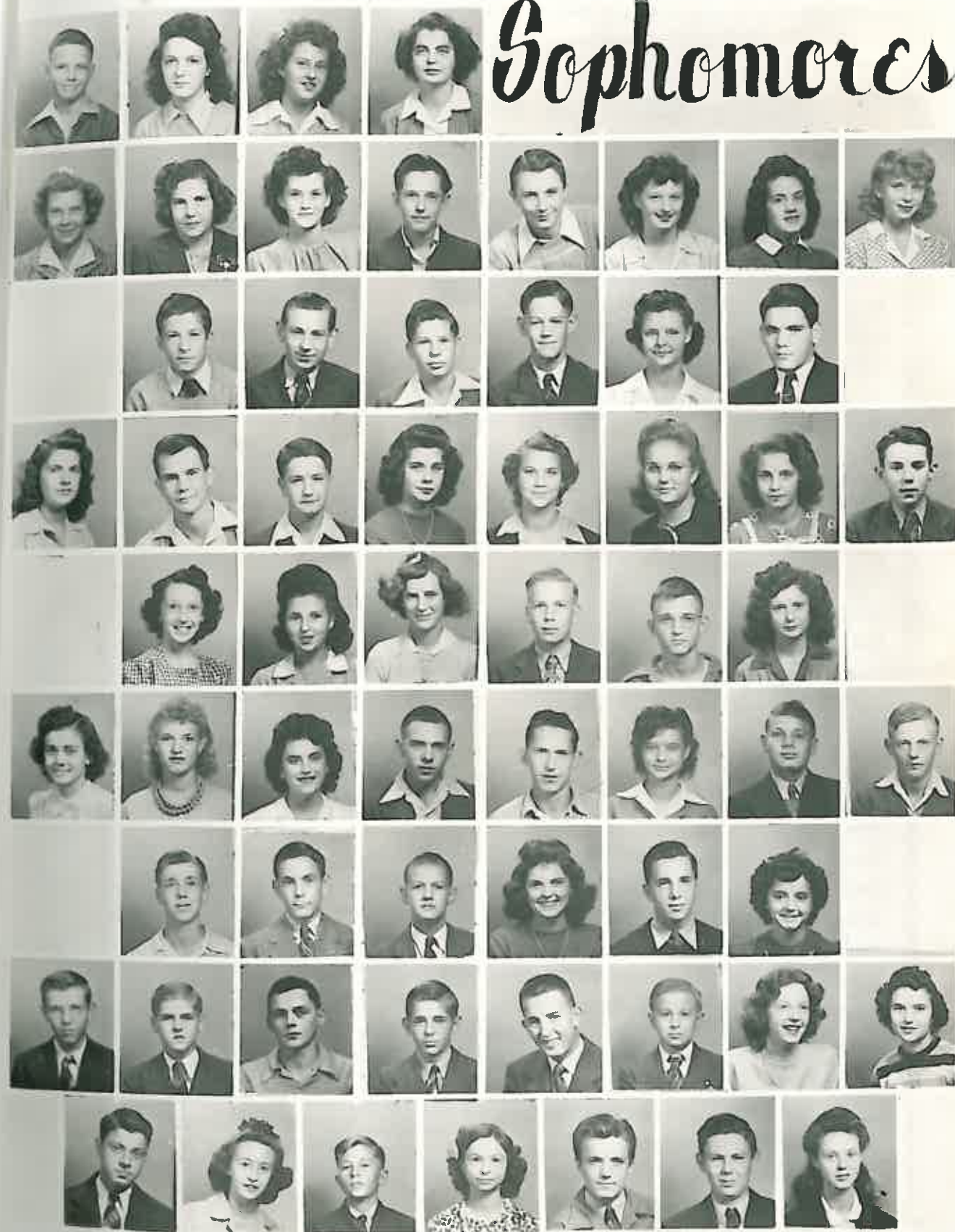

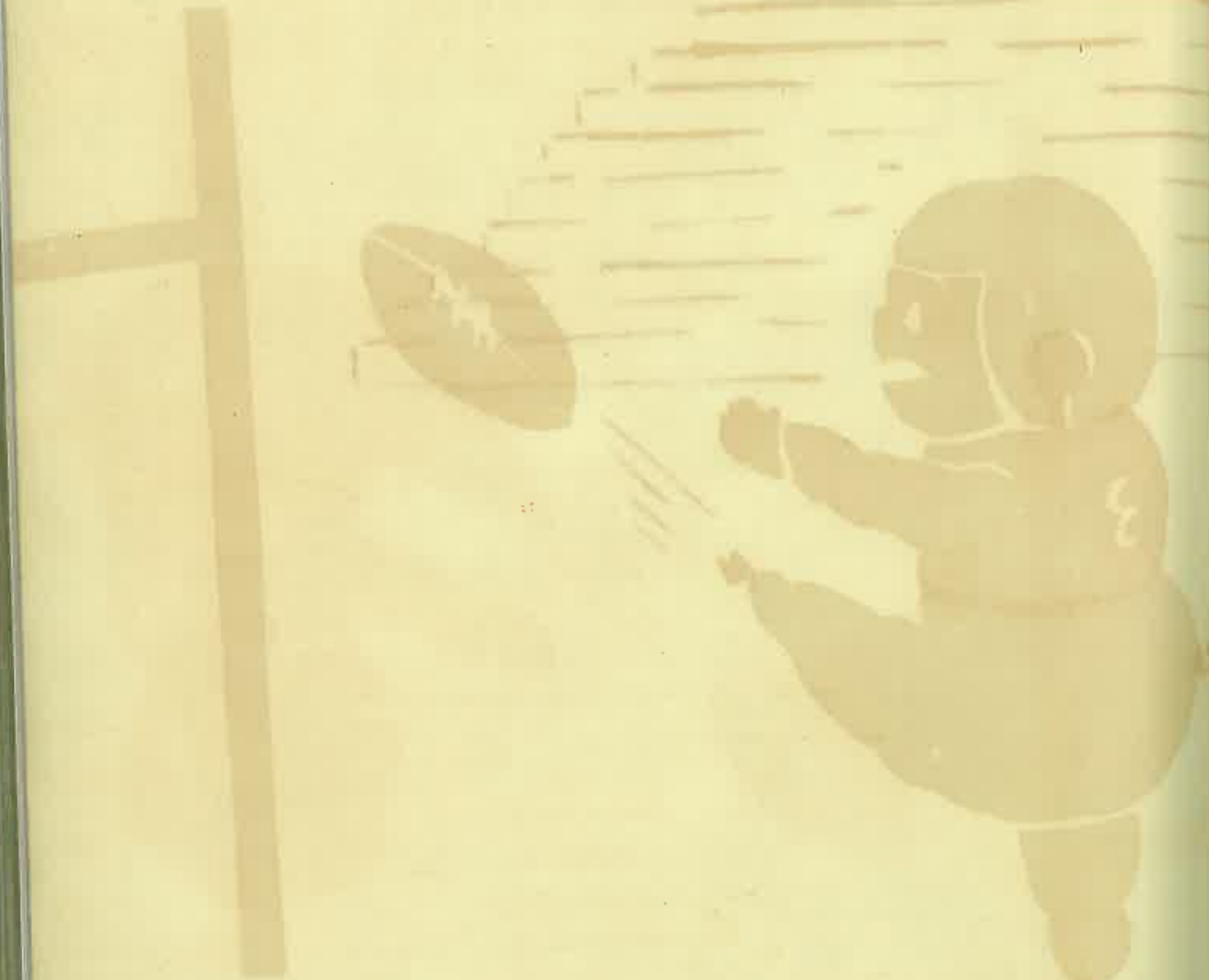
FACULTY PRODUCTION

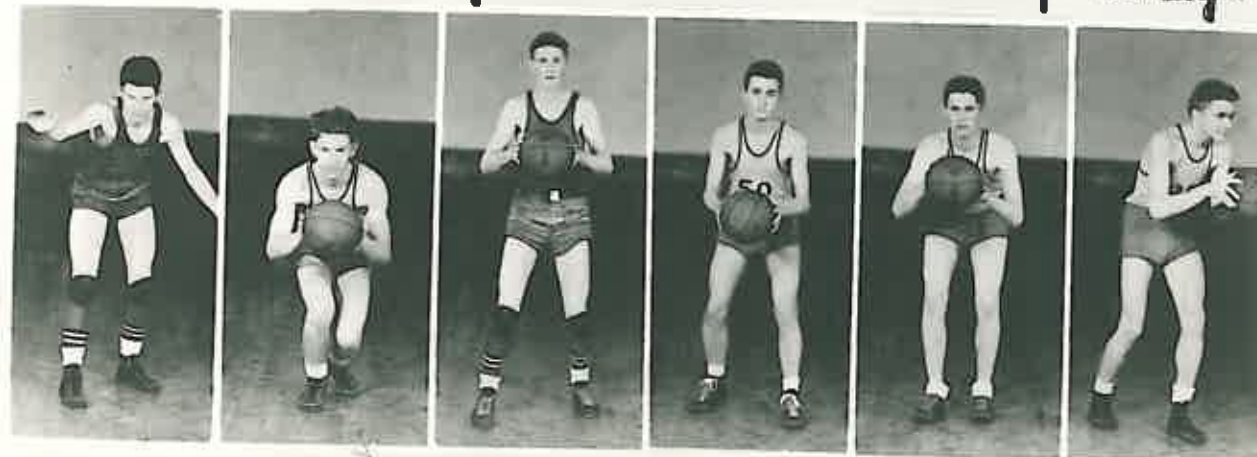

ACTIVITIES OF THE SCHOOL BAND

The Jackson Band of '43-'44 numbered exactly 70. During the year the band made 16 public appearances including three formal programs by the concert band and maneuvers at 6 football games. All maneuvers were photographed on movie film.

At the football games the pre-game ceremony began with a fanfare by the band followed by a Floating "J" down the field breaking into a fanfare spread. Following the second fanfare came a "Hi" followed by the initial of the visiting school in a shield as the band played the visitors' school song. This formation broke into a Block "T" for Jackson Indians followed by the J. H. S. Alma Mater and the band marched off the field to the strains of Jackson Fight Song.

At the half of one game a "Salute to the Armed Services" was given. This included a shield with the initial of the Navy, Air Corps, Coast Guard, Field Artillery and Marines, each followed by an appropriate formation while the band played the official song of each service.

"An American War Review," probably the best and most difficult band show of the season, was given at the Charleston and Central Games. Leaving their caps on the field in the position of a map of the United States of America, the band formed the date of each war in which we have been engaged and followed each of these with an appropriate formation. They were 1776, Liberty Bell; 1812, U. S.; 1845, Lone Star; 1860, two circles, representing the North and South united in one large circle; 1898, the battleship "Maine;" 1917, a Red Cross; 1941 an American Flag. After these formations it marched from the field.

Instead of the one annual spring concert by the concert band there were three given—one on the evening of February 11, one on the afternoon of March 19, and one the evening of April 21. The baccalaureate and commencement programs marked the band's final appearance of the season.

BOYS' AND GIRLS' GLEE CLUBS

The vocal groups of JHS consisted of boys' and girls' glee clubs, chosen from the chorus classes and a choir chosen from the glee clubs.

There were 30 in the boys glee club, forty-three in the girls glee club and 50 in the choir. During the year these groups sang at various programs for many of the local organizations.

The climax of the years work was the presentation of the formal concert on April 14, at the crowning of the Silver Arrow Queen.

WAR CLASSES

In the last few years, because of the war, several different Classes have been added to the Jackson High School curriculum in order to lend guidance and give instruction to those planning to enter the armed forces and the new fields that have been opened to young men and women. Some of the classes have been taught for many years but just recently brought to the foreground and emphasis given to them. Others are of newer origin and have added greater importance to the school.

Among the new War Classes is Aeronautics, a two semester course, taught by Supt. Russell Hawkins, open only to boys—this is the third year for this class. It teaches boys entering the army, navy and marine flying programs what to expect and is beneficial in the entrance exams to these programs.

Radio teaches how to receive code messages. Both boys and girls take this and, like Aeronautics, it is of great benefit to the boys and girls taking up flying. This is a one semester course taught by Miss Ella Browning.

Spanish is one of the War Classes which will definitely be added to the post war curricular. Not only does it teach the language, but it leads to a better understanding of our Latin and South American neighbors. Miss Eileen Yount is the instructor.

For many years physics has been taught but lack of interest caused the enrollment to drop, but this year, because of the emergency, a two-semester class was offered again. Under the guidance of Mr. Lem Bollinger, students enrolling in this class have learned all about why everything works.

For many years, phases of electricity have been studied in connection with General Shop, but this year it seemed advisable to offer a special course in electricity, taught by Mr. Wm. Lamonte.

In years to come students will look back at the 1943-44 curriculum as being one of the most unusual in the history of J. H. S.
