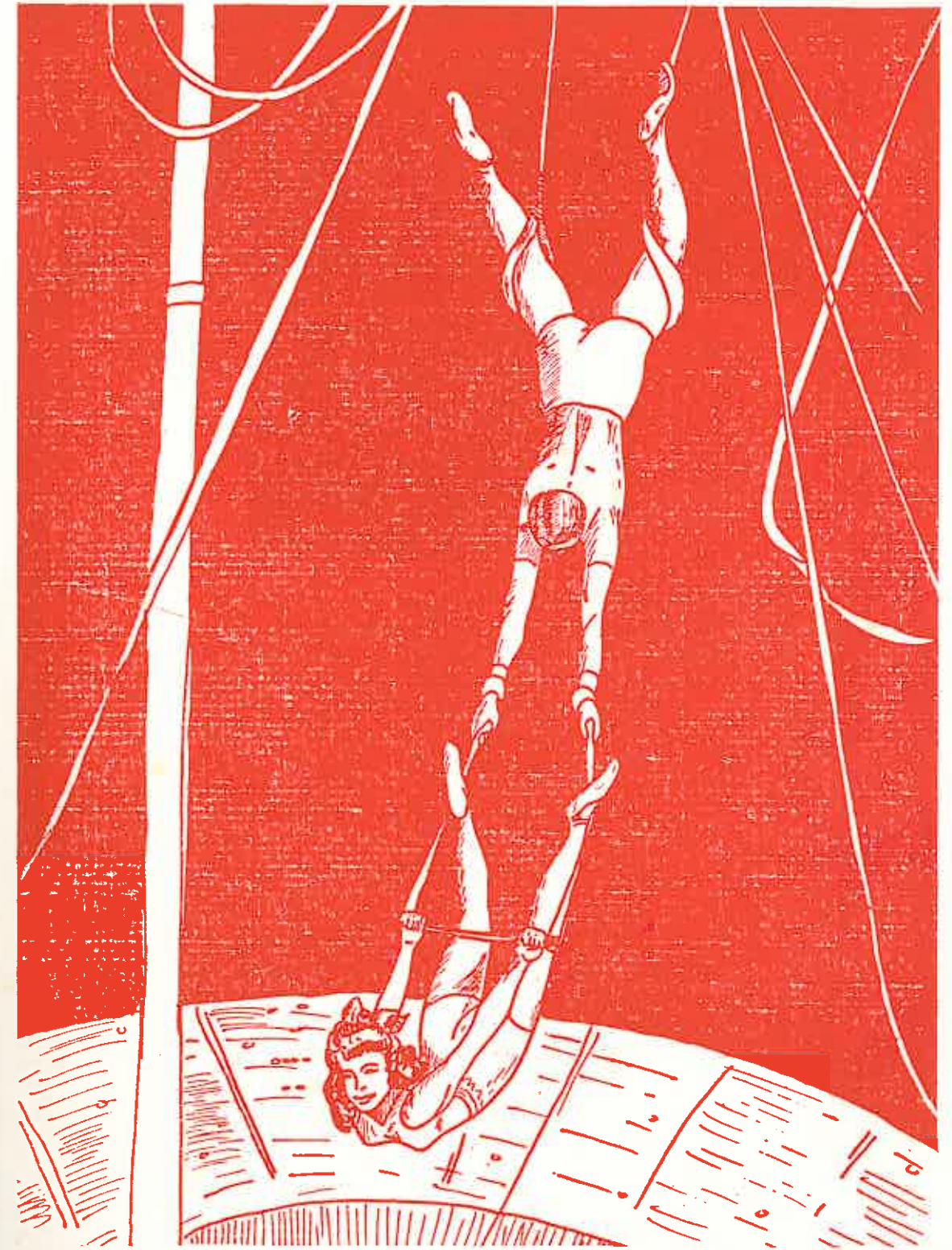

October 9—"Smile please," Mr. Evans of Jackson Studio was here to take individual pictures for the Silver Arrow.

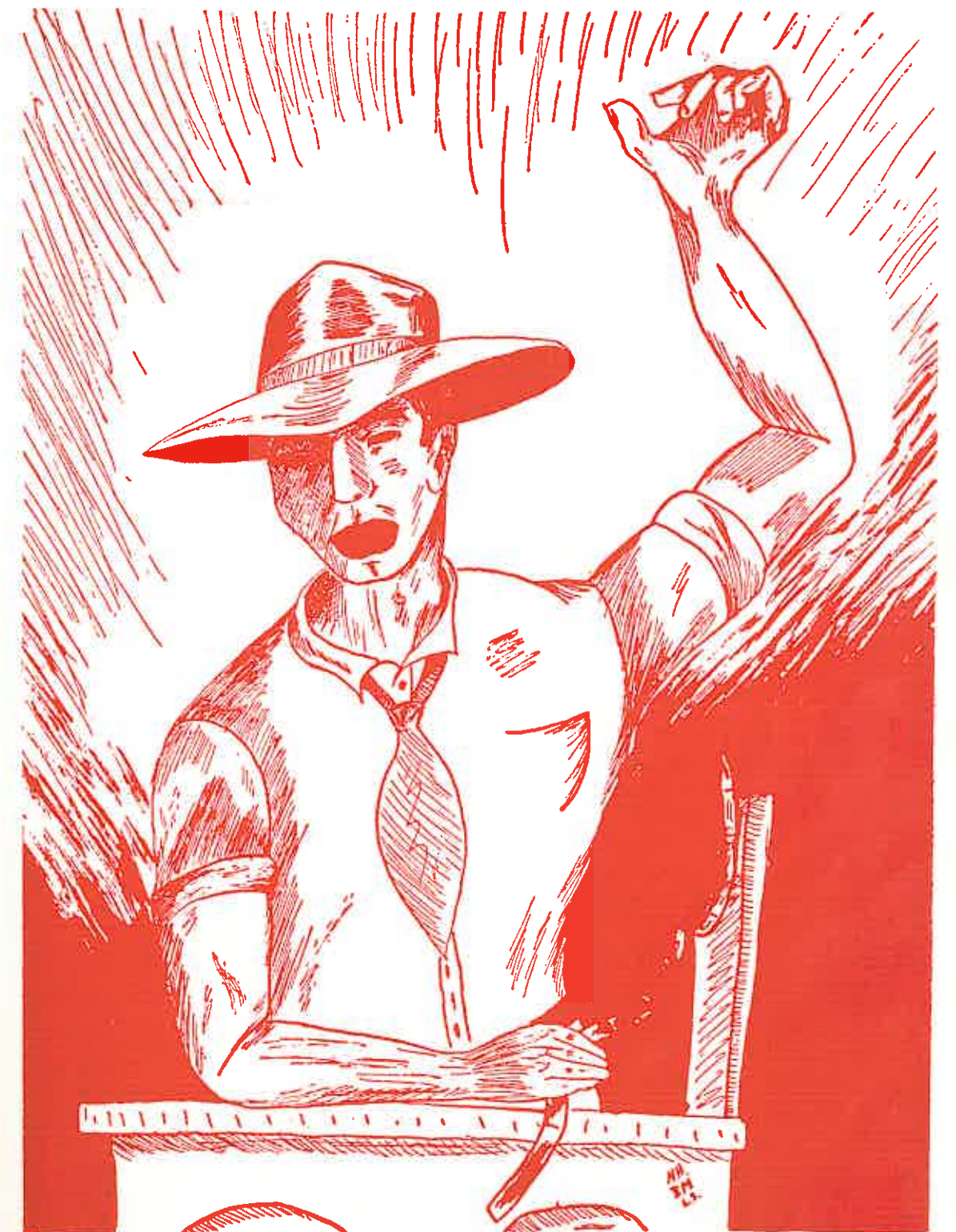
October 10—Band program at Kennett game. First home game of the season. Kennett passing defeats Jackson Indians.

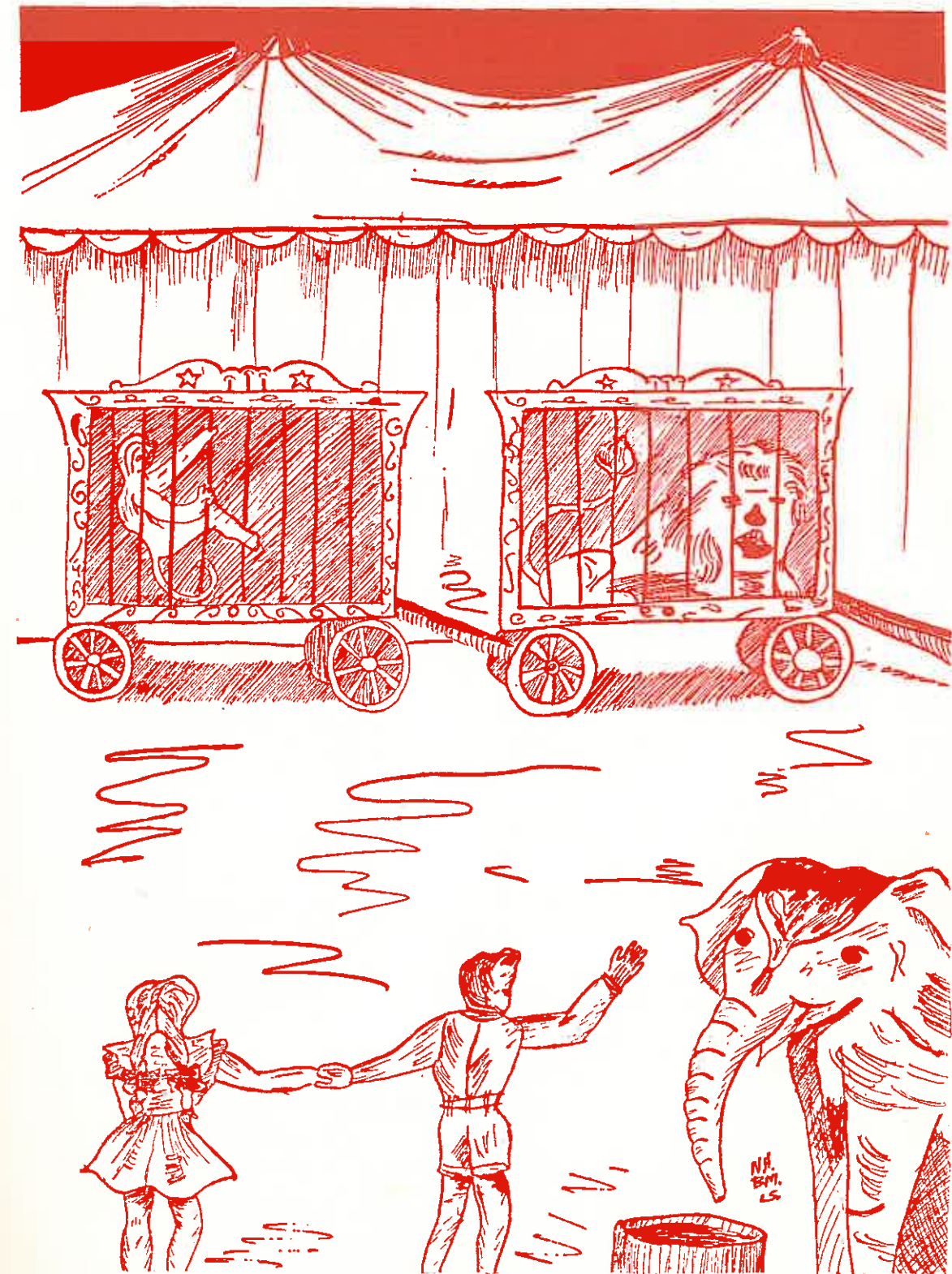

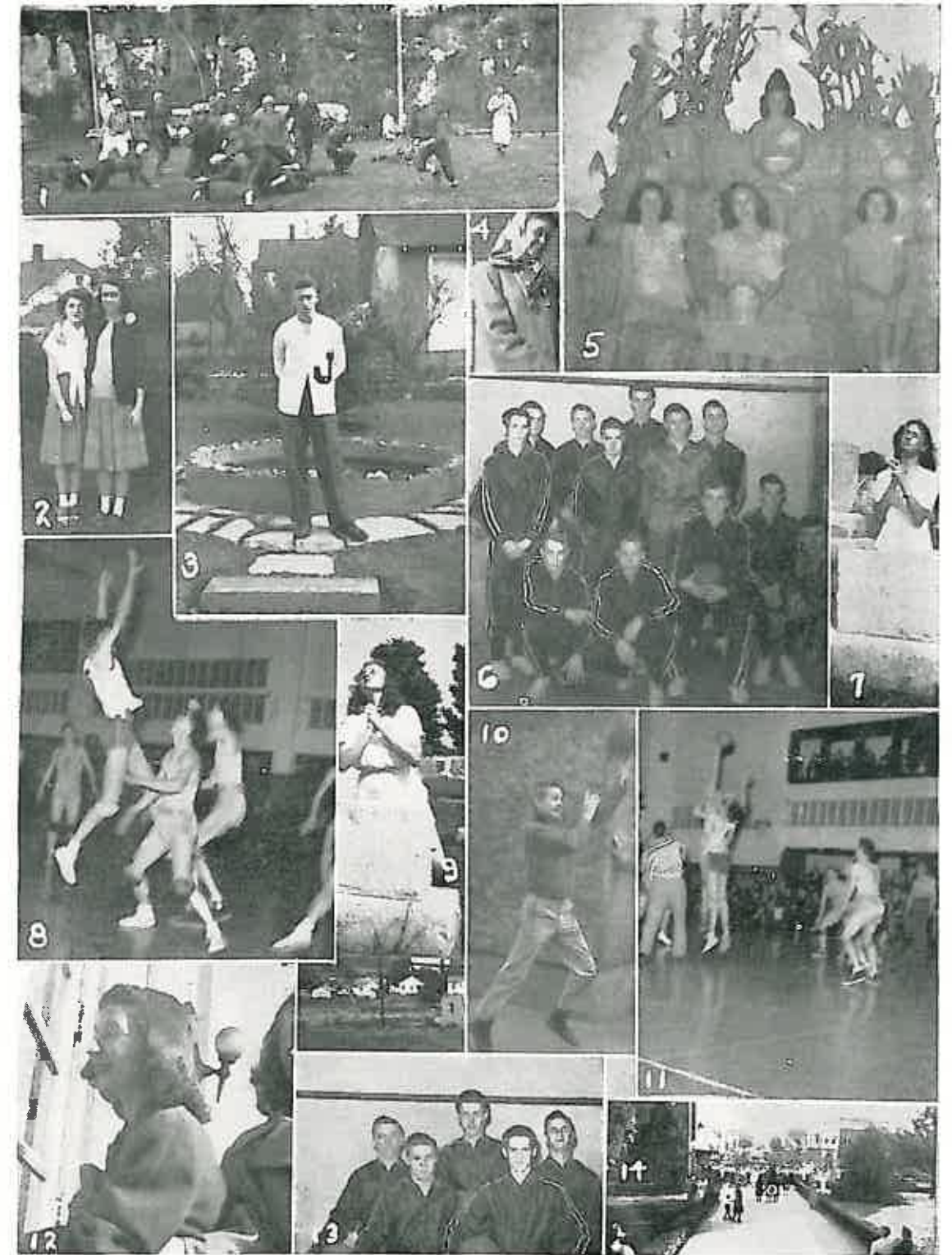

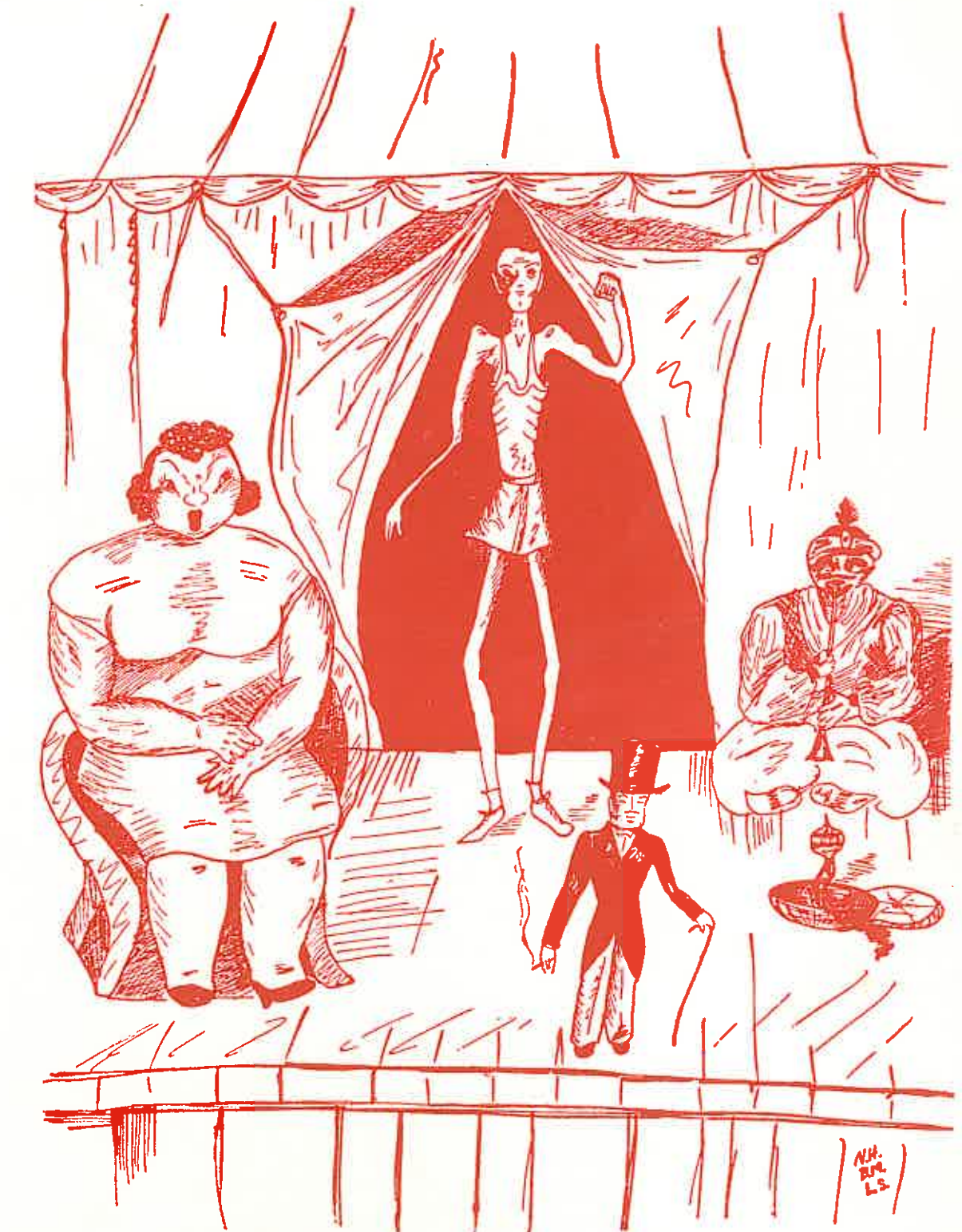

Sophomore Class Play

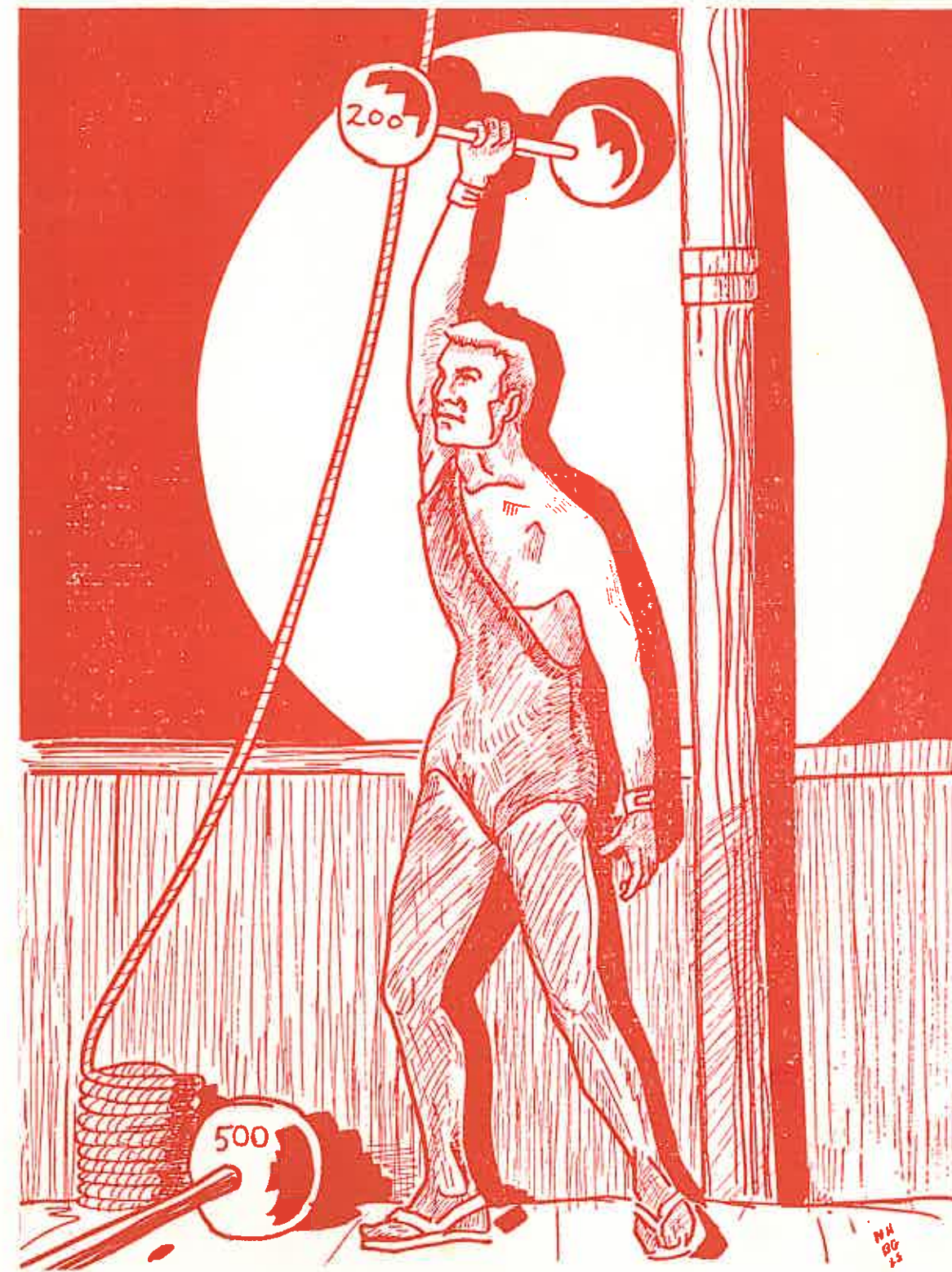
