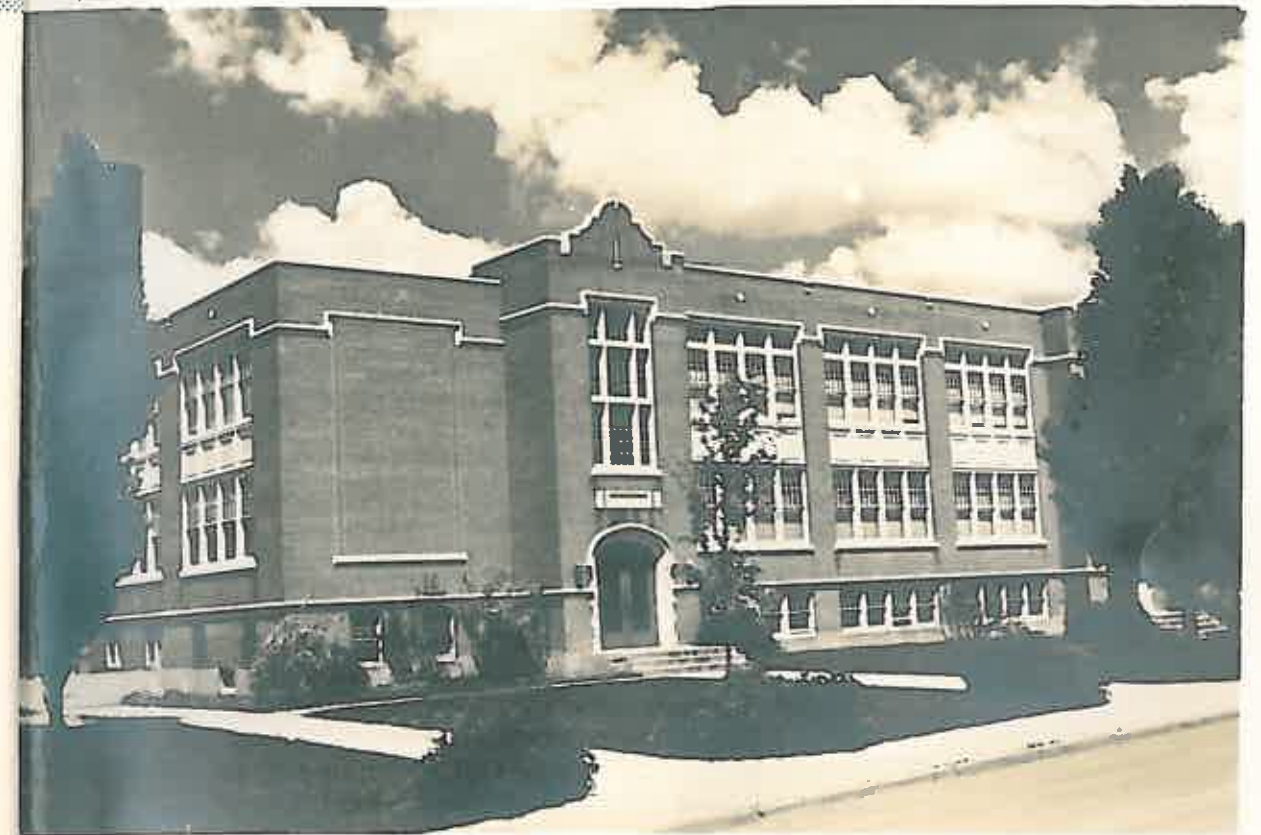
## Our Public School

In those last days of Indian summer, when school has just opened its doors and the students haven't yet settled down to the daily routine of classes, many of us spend some of our time looking out the window. Into our line of vision comes a little girl dressed in gingham or a little boy dressed in his first long trousers. These children are just beginning to get the "feel" of school days. These little boys and girls have a much better school than those who started to school in the years before the new school building was built.

All of us who started our school days then remember the school building and grade school system of those days. The first and second grades were located in the high school building in the rooms which have since been turned into the cafeteria. The rest of the grades were located in the old grade school building. This building was torn down in 1939. A beautiful building was built and the location of the old building was turned into a playground for the children.

The principal of the Jackson Grade School this year is Mr. T. L. St. Clair. The students have enjoyed their work this year. The high school students often visited this grade school building, one of the finest in the state, to attend assemblies in the auditorium.

Our own high school is one of the best equipped and operated in S. E. Mo. Beside the many classrooms in this building there is a cafeteria which serves lunches to the students of both the grade and high school. There is also a gymnasium which is the scene of many friendly basketball contests between schools as well as the sub-regional basketball tournament. It is a member of the highest accrediting agency of high schools and colleges in the North Central States. The values of it plus the other school buildings, grounds and equipment has been estimated at about \$325,000.

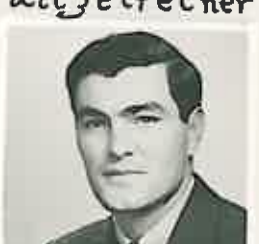

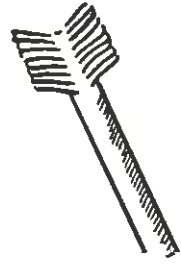

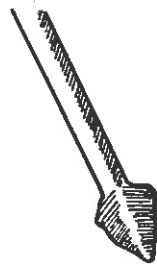
## FOREWORD
