Yes, indeed, square dancing provided diversion at the FFA Barnwarmin' Tuesday, November 11, in the new farm shop in Jackson High Stadium.

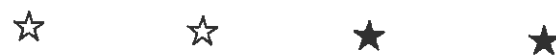

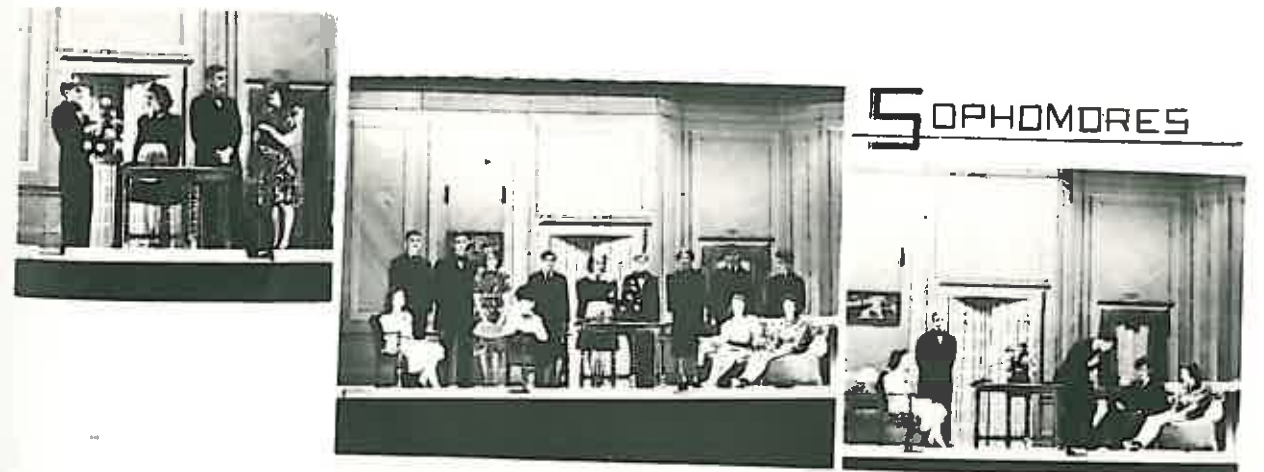

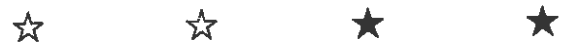
The physics group is building a film enlarger while the biology group is collecting and identifying as many invertebrates as can be found in the region of the club. The club plans to present a program at a local college soon.

THURSDAY, OCT. 16 — Vacation! State Teacher's Meeting. No school until Monday.

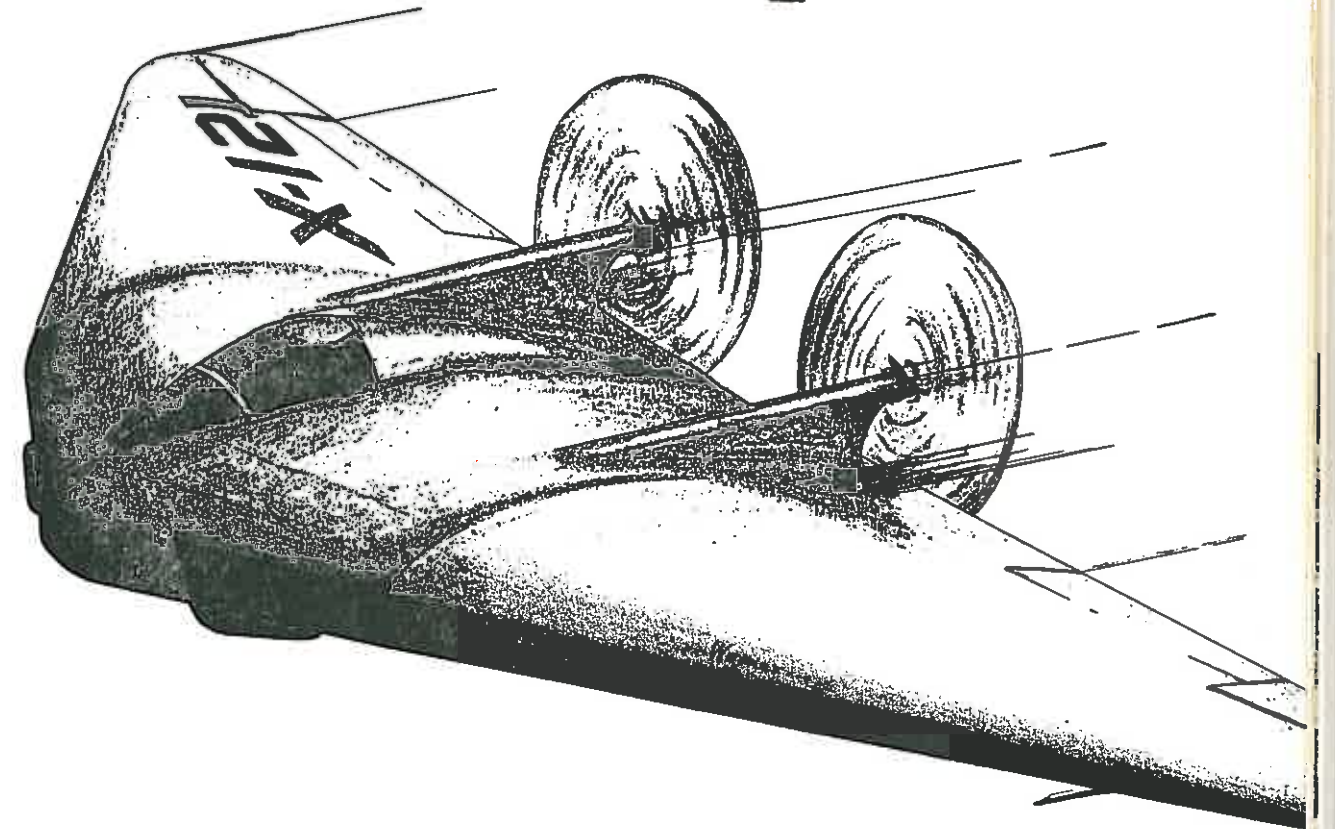
FRIDAY, OCT. 17 — There was a game at Dexter. Just the football boys went.

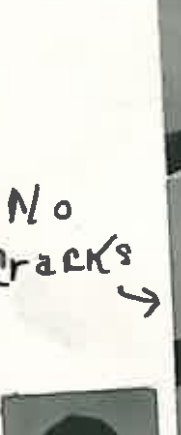

Leading point scorers for the year were Gene Morton, first and John Schulte, second.

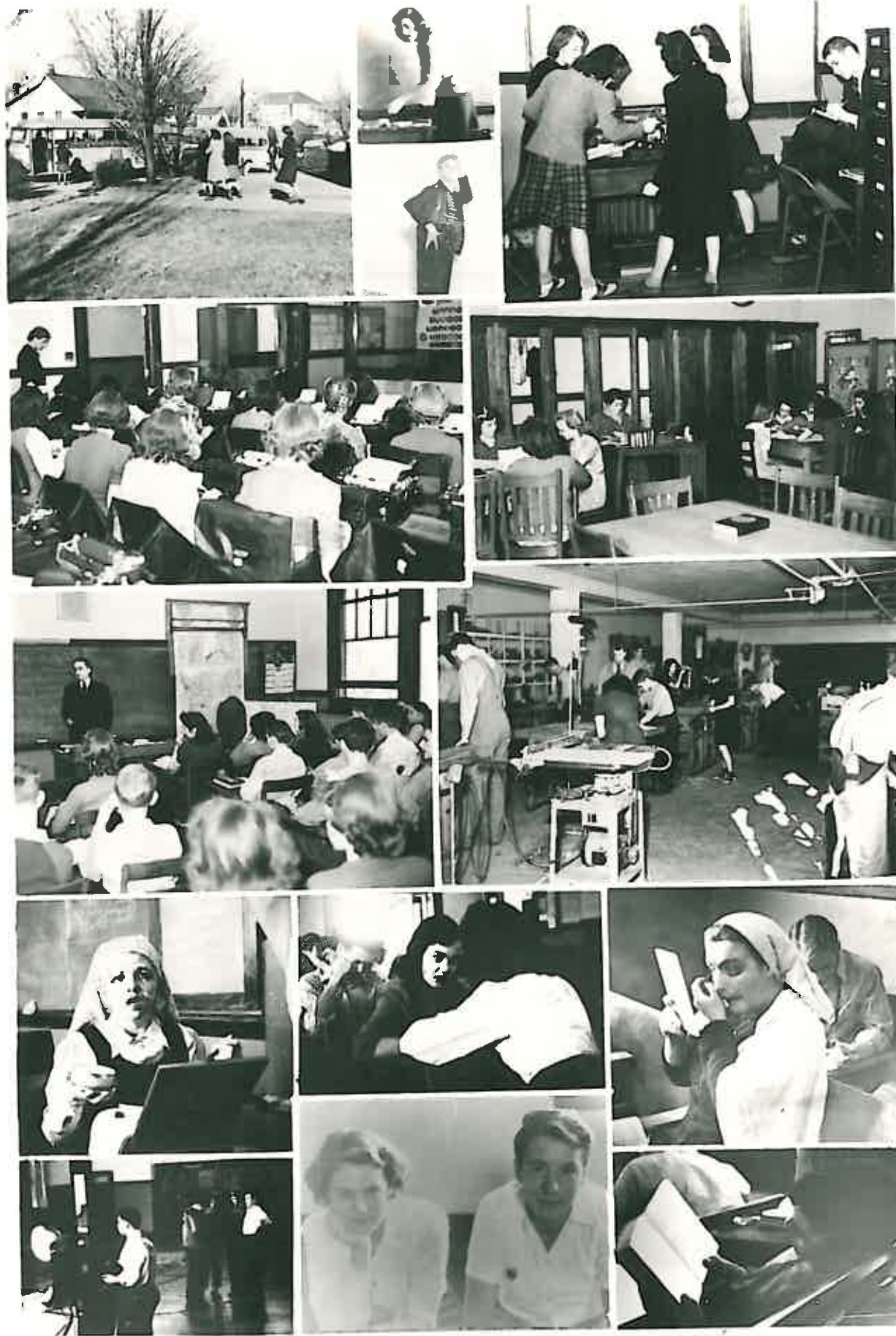
CLASS A REGIONAL TOURNAMENT

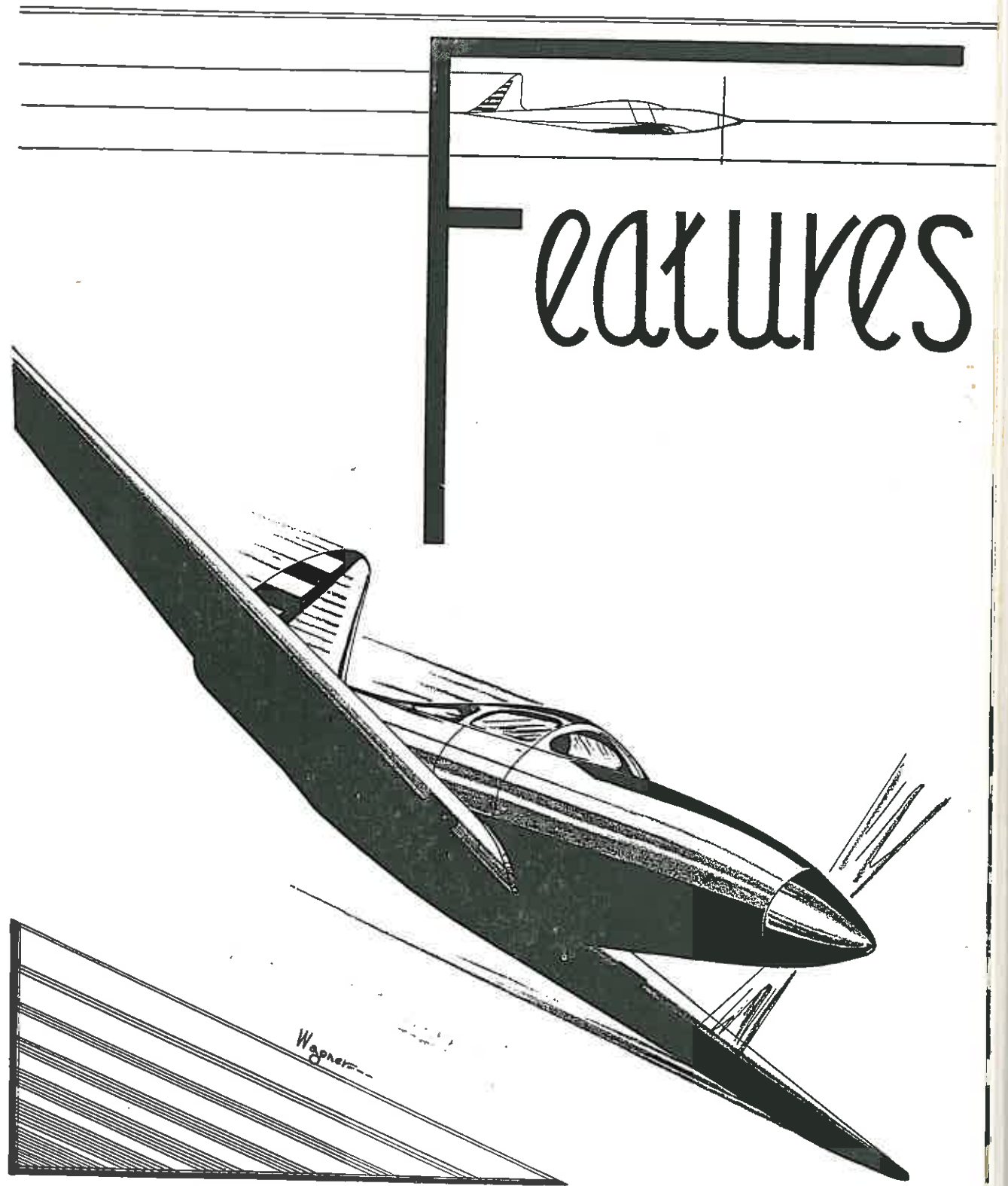

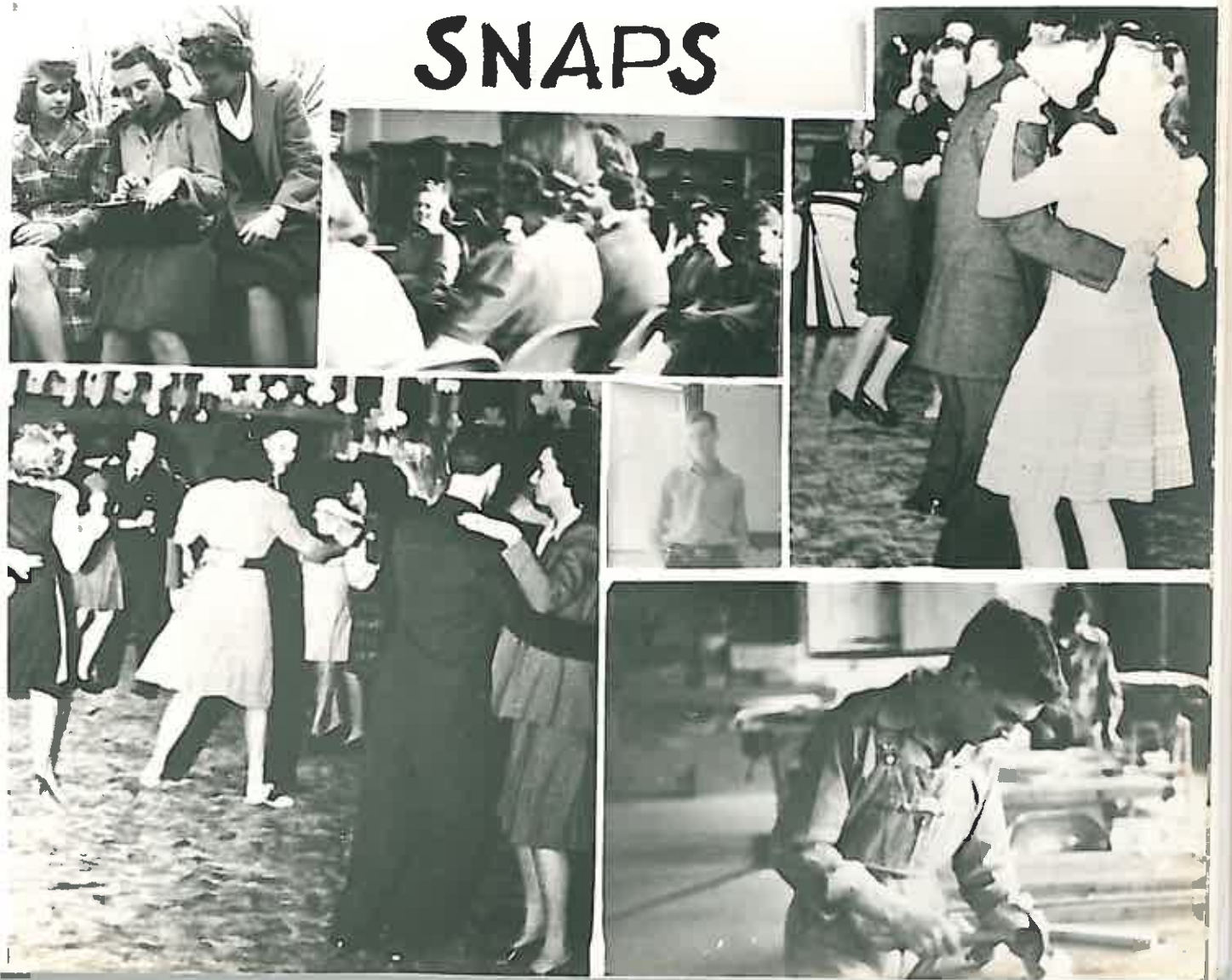
The Big Chief crowned the Queen with the following words:

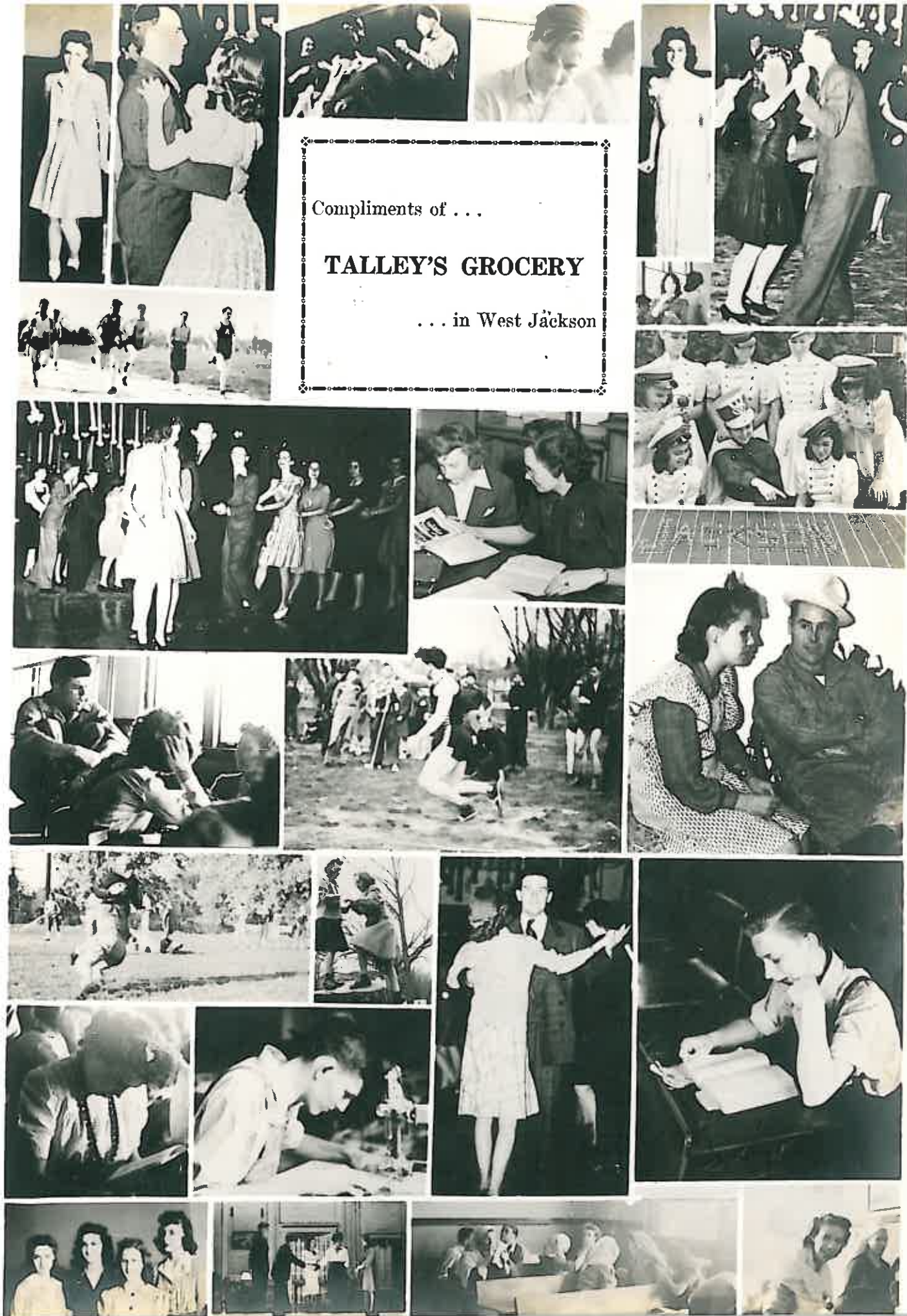
