SUMMARY OF 1937 FOOTBALL SEASON

The Jackson High School football team coached by Mr. Elmer Seefeld had a very successful season with no defeats and one scoreless tie. We scored 193 points to our opponents' 21 points.

Jackson was champion of the Northern Division of the Southeast Missouri Conference; Kennett, of the Southern Division. Although Jackson had defeated Kennett earlier in the season, no post-season game was played for the championship of Southeast Missouri.

Three Indians, "Funny" Nothdurft, "Doc" Sneathen and Cecil Davis were placed on the first all-star team of Southeast Missouri. Murrell Godwin and Charles Fatchett, on the second team; and Woodrow Niswonger, Eugene Statler and Norman Swan were given honorable mention.

The season started with 20 boys out for football, the number increasing to 26 by the end of the season.

There were nineteen lettermen. The lettermen are co-Captains Murrell Godwin and Cecil Davis; Eugene Statler, Norman Swan, Charles Fatchett, Woodrow Niswonger, Ollen Deneke, Harry Penrod, Denzil Bollinger, co-Captains-elect Milton Nothdurft and Douglas Sneathen; Willis Kieninger, Gene Cracraft, Charles Overbeck, Harry Long, J. E. Hagans, Jack Obermiller, L. R. Seabaugh and Ralph Wolters. Leonard Swan, Clemen Quade, Paul Mueller, Billy Deck, Milton Frenzel, Lenzil Bollinger and J. T. Allen were the other members of the squad.

The season started with a practice game with Chaffee in which we were defeated.

On October 1, we met Farmington and defeated them by a score of 20-7, surprising many local fans by playing a good brand of football.

In renewal of their traditional grid rivalry, the Indians battled Central High Tigers to a scoreless tie in Houck Field Stadium on October 8. The outstanding feature of the game occurred when Davis brightened the fans by dashing from our 40-yard line to Central's 20-yard line, where he fell. 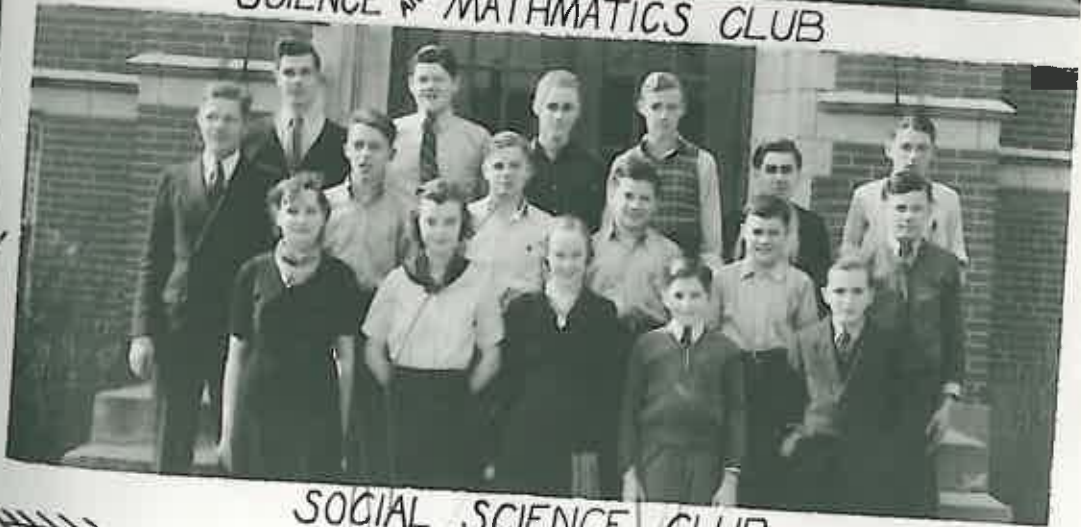

The Senior Class presented the play, "Headed for Eden", on March 31, under the direction of Miss Ruth Morgan, the class sponsor.

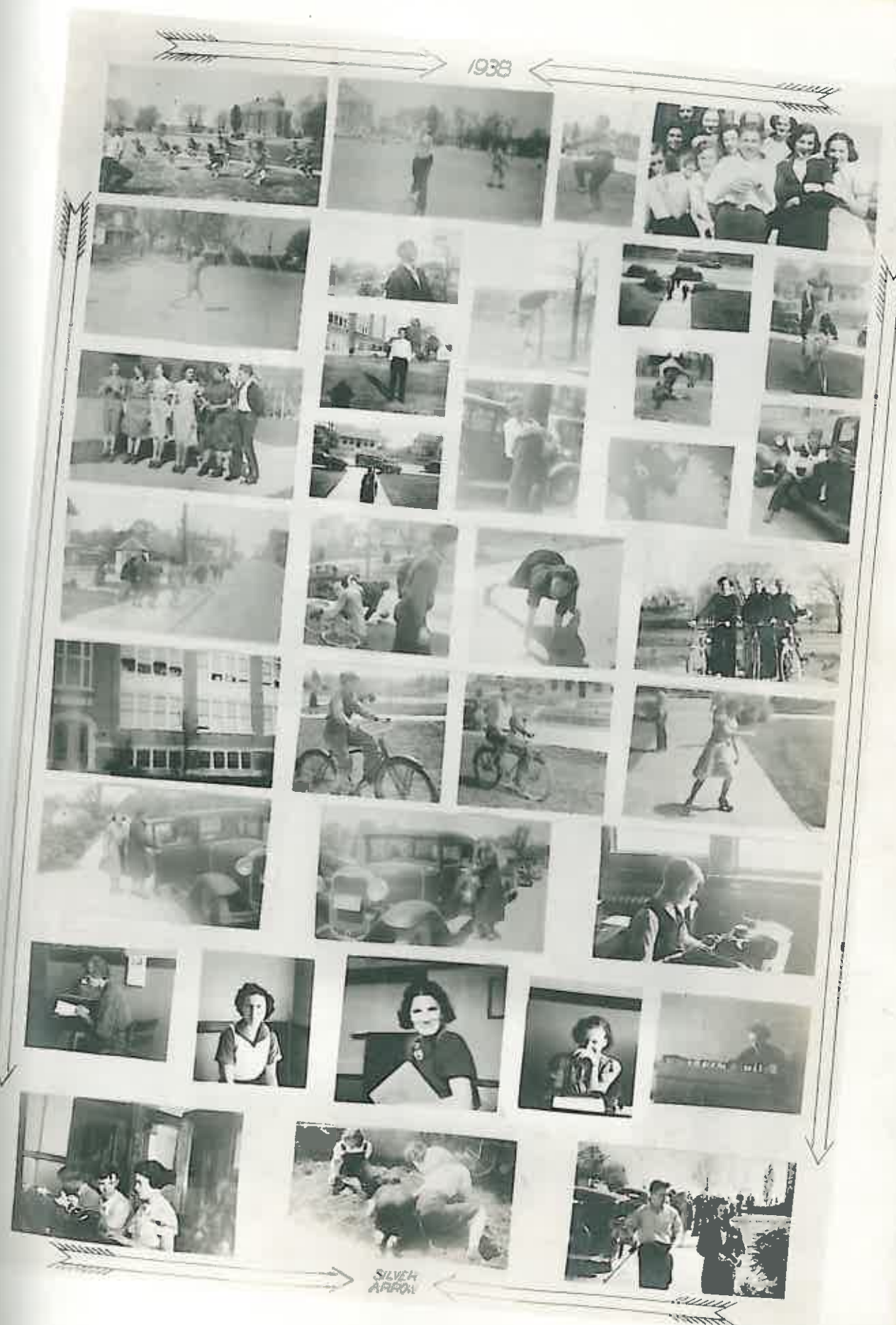

May 11. The teachers had a picnic.

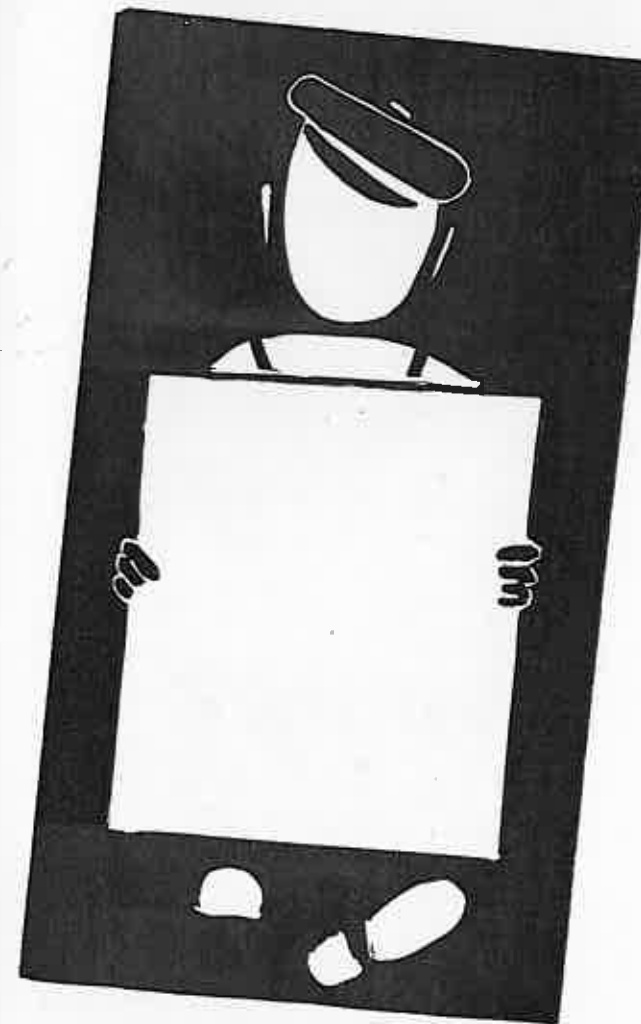
May 15. The Baccalaureate Sermon. There are 48 seniors who are graduating.
