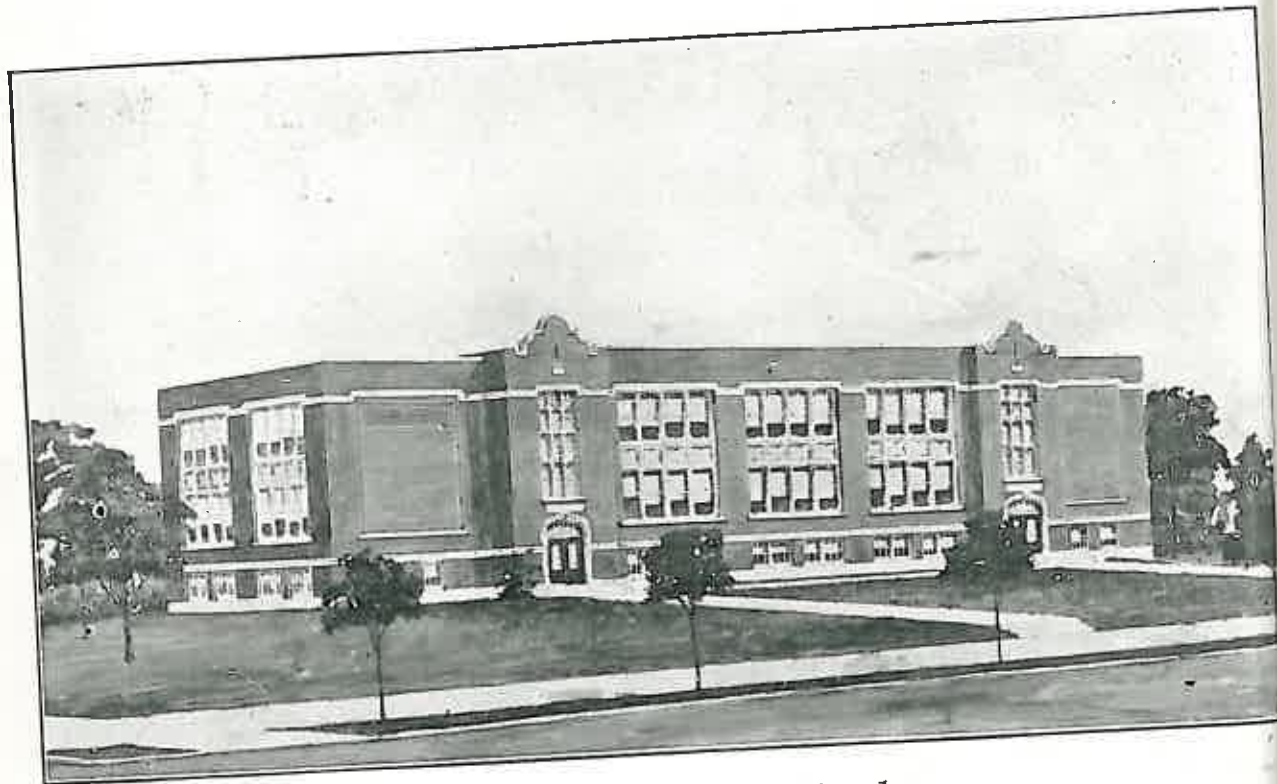

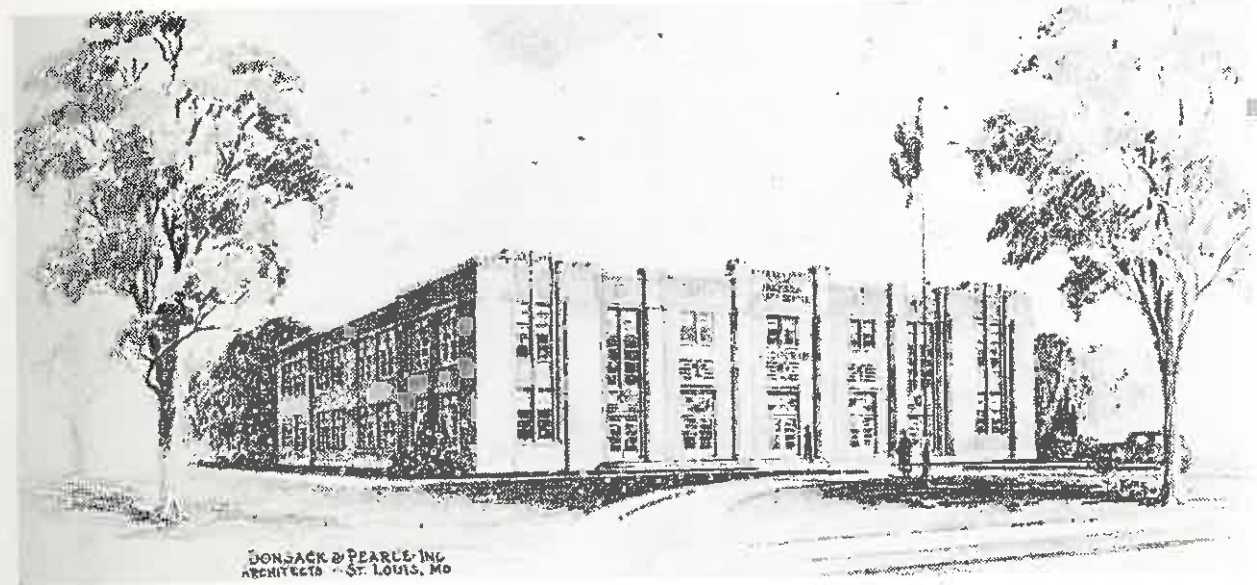

History of Jackson High School

In the Silver Arrow for 1938-1939 the staff and sponsors have endeavored to carry out the theme of progress. To us who now enjoy the finest educational advantages, it is interesting to note how this progress has been brought about.

Before 1904 students desiring education beyond the eighth grade attended either Carlisle Training School, Jackson Military Academy, or a school other than those in Jackson.

In 1904 the Jackson Public School system was extended to offer two years of high school work. In 1907 there were three high school teachers besides a music teacher, whose work was only part time.

Twelve and one-half units were offered in 1907-1908, placing Jackson on the partially accredited list. The units were: English, three units; algebra, one and one-half; plain geometry, one; Latin, three; zoology, one; American history, one; solid geometry, one-half; plain trigonometry, one-half; and medieval and modern history, one.

During the summer of 1908 a water system was installed in the building. In the fall of that year a four year high school course was adopted on trial. The purchase of the Jackson Military Academy building the next year proved that the course was to be continued, and in 1909 Jackson High School was classified as a second class school, offering 16 units which included three units in English, four in mathematics, four in history, one in science, and four in Latin. In the following year the school was placed on the list of fully accredited schools.

During the Christmas holidays of 1909 a water system and heating system were installed in the newly purchased high school building.

The educational tours which have become so popular during the present school year probably had their beginning on September 29, 1911, when a holiday was granted by the school board so that students might go to the Cape County Fair and see the airplane fly.

In 1913 a teacher's training class was organized and during that school year the school was given credit of being a First Class High School.

The first annual was published in 1914. Fifteen annuals have been published by the school since that time.

In 1917 domestic science was incorporated in the curriculum, and in 1918 a commercial teacher was employed, but only bookkeeping was taught and that was discontinued after a few years.

The present high school building was erected in 1920. It was up-to-date in every respect and valued at \$125,000.

A manual training department was placed in the high school in 1923. Two years of woodwork and one year of mechanical drawing are now offered.

In 1925 the school board elected a teacher to keep the library and study hall.

Because of the increased enrollment in the high school, the present gymnasium and several class rooms were added to the building in 1928 at a cost of \$45,000.

In 1929 a regular commercial department, which now offers instruction in typing, shorthand, secretarial training, and bookkeeping, was established.

It is interesting to note that at one time there were more instructors in high school than there are at the present time. In 1930 there were thirteen members of the faculty excluding the band director.

The Jackson High School Band was organized in 1930. Many additions have been made to the band since that time and it is now one of the most active organizations in school.

The graduating class of 1931 was the first to wear caps and gowns and since that time each class has been required to wear the standard caps and gowns.

In 1932 manual training, teacher's training and physical education were dropped from the curriculum. Manual training was again installed in 1934 and physical education in 1936. Also in 1936 debating, which has continually gained in popularity, was added as an extra-curricular activity which necessitated adding a teacher to the faculty. In that year the senior class ring was standardized.

A school bus was purchased in 1937 and another in 1938. In addition to conveying students to and from school, these busses are used for extra-curricular purposes, such as educational tours and athletic contests.

The classes were lengthened in 1937 from forty-five minutes to one hour. Because of the increased enrollment this year an additional teacher was elected. There were two hundred seventy-six students enrolled in Jackson High School for the year 1938-1939. The faculty consists of twelve members and thirty-two units of credit are offered which include four units in English, three units in vocational home economics, two in vocal music, two in band, one-half unit in public speaking, one-half unit in dramatics, two units in shorthand, one in bookkeeping, one in typing, two in Latin, one in American history, one in World history, two in woodwork, one in mechanical drawing, one in basketry, one in physics, one-half unit in American government, one-half unit in economics, one-half unit in sociology, one in geography, one in algebra, one in plane

There is an assembly at least once a week. The six clubs—Dramatic, Courtesy, Commercial, "J", Photography, and V. H. E.—hold meetings every two weeks. On weeks clubs do not meet some other educational program is arranged. The choir for the past year has been unusually active. Besides preparing numbers for the district and state contests, they have sung at almost all churches and organizations in the community.

In the fall of 1938 the football stadium was dedicated under floodlights. In addition to the splendid extra-curricular athletic program, an intra-mural program was begun in 1937 and has been declared the outstanding program of its kind in the state of Missouri.

The graduating class this year consists of sixty members and is the largest one in the history of the school.

At the present time a new grade school is under construction south of the high school building in which all major dramatic productions of both schools will be given. This building is not surpassed by any other in the state.

Only recently sidewalks, curbs, and gutters were laid around almost the entire school grounds. The street in front of the high school was paved in the fall of 1938 and other streets around the grounds are to be paved soon.

It can be clearly seen that Jackson High School has made great progress since 1904 and it is only to be expected that it will continue to progress.

In carrying out the theme of progress the pictures on the division pages of this book, with one exception, were taken from the first annual published in 1914. The picture on the Administration page is of the old Jackson Military Academy purchased in 1909 for the high school; for the classes is a picture of a class of 1914; a picture of the Student Senate of 1914 for the organization page; a J. M. A. football squad represents athletics; on the page entitled "Features" will be found the picture of the cast for the play, "Mrs. Briggs of the Poultry Yard", produced in 1914. While the pictures on these division pages show the old photographs in contrast with the present, the cartoons on the pages of the different classes are modernistic in design and show the present trend.

It is the sincere wish of the staff and its sponsors that you will enjoy this annual, marking one-fourth century of progress in Jackson High School yearbooks.

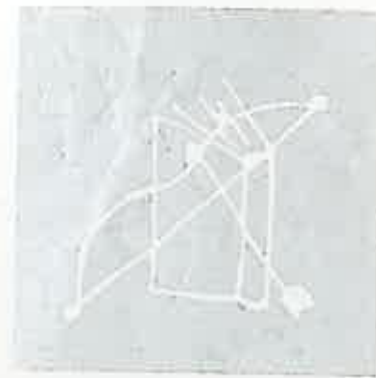

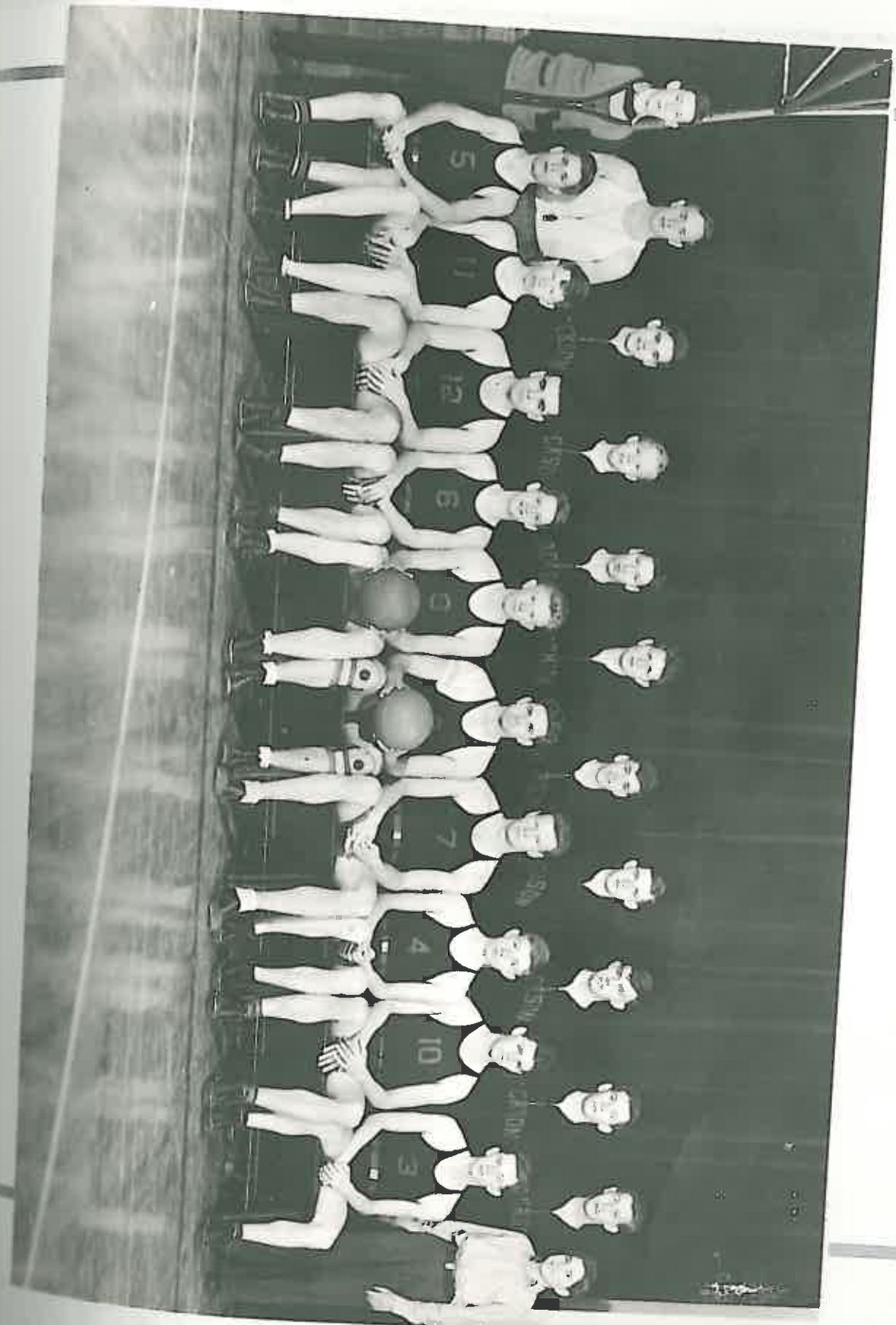

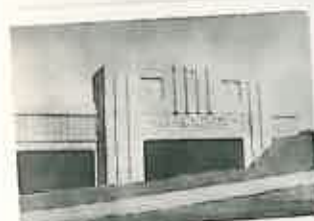

Jackson High School Alumni Association

The same type of program is followed each year. This year the class of 1928 was honored on the tenth anniversary of the organization. The present officers of the association are president, Allen Fulenwider; vice-president, Joe Haupt; secretary, Clarence Schade; and treasurer, Mildred Heinberg.

A graduate of Jackson High School automatically becomes a member of the association.

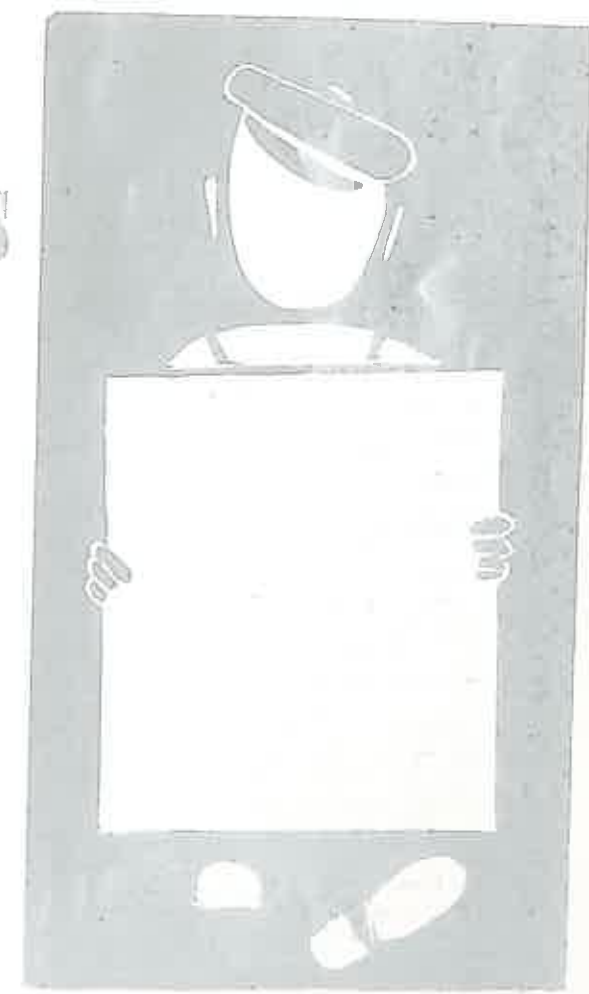
