The high school debating term closed a season that the students and friends of the community should well be proud of. Representing our school Jess Stewart and Clarence Dalton carried the honor of the school into the finals of the Southeast Missouri competition.

The schools of the state were divided into districts and earlier in the season were paired for county competition. All representative schools debated the question, "Resolved, That Installment Buying as now practiced in the United States is both Socially and Economically Desirable." For the opening debate we were matched with the Cape Central debaters on December 5 and won the unanimous decision of the judges upholding the affirmative side of the question. December 19 we met the Training high school debaters of Cape Girardeau, the school that won the district finals last season, and received a 3-0 decision of the judges, and at the same time giving us the county championship. These two contests were held at Cape

Then we met winners of other districts. Morley, winner of Scott county, preferred the negative, to which we agreed. The forensic tilt was held at the Cape Teachers College and the judges awarded a unanimous decision to the affirmative which the local team upheld. In our bracket Caruthersville, Campbell and Jackson remained undefeated. Campbell drew the bye. Jackson met Caruthersville here and won a 3-0 decision, again upholding the affirmative

Then came the time to eliminate the other three teams in the semi-finals. Bloomfield drew a bye and Jackson met Campbell here. It was our first argument on the negative side but the boys ably handled the case and received a 2-1 decision. It was the first vote against them in five contests. In the finals Bloomfield won the toss and chose to take the affirmative side. We lost a 1-2 decision to a debating team that made an enviable record this season, in addition to winning the district title, placed second in the William Woods tournament at Fulton. One of their debaters had four years experience. This was the first year experience for the Jackson pair. Jess Stewart will be lost through graduation but we hope to build a formidable contender around Clarence Dalton and other available material.

Let us repeat that we feel proud of our boys and express our appreciation for the enviable record made in forensic achievement to place Jackson to the forefront,

other than athletic competition. It was the first time in four years that Jackson high school ranked among the finalists of the district. 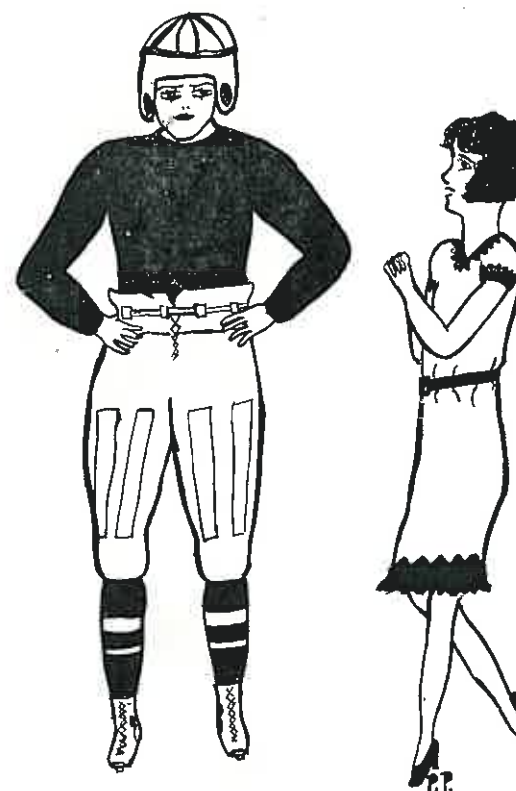

The twenty-fifth annual high school literary and field meet was held at Cape Girardeau this season with a record entry list. The local high school was represented in the majority of the literary events. Competition was among the best seen or heard at any district meet.

The mixed quartet, composed of Evelyn Schneider, Madge Gbermiller, Glen Mayfield and Martin Wagner, Jr., won a beautiful trophy for first honors. Jess Stewart placed second in the extemporae speaking. The winner, Dorothy Mallory of Bloomfield, had the occasion to debate against Jess in the final district debate. Wilbert Moll won second place in mechanical drawing.

Two records of several years standing were thrown into discard as the result of cinder track stars competing on the new Houck Field cinder track. Two men of three years experience set marks. Sumpter, a slender youth of Bonne Terre, sped around the 440-yard oval twice in 2 minutes and 4.5 seconds, smashing the record set by Hamby of Sikeston in 1924, by 2.7 seconds. Wilkins of Hornersville leaped into the broad-jump pit for a distance of 21 ft. 6 in. to better by 3 inches a record of 14 years standing and made by Hequemberg of Charleston.

Jackson placed in three events. Wilson Dalton was nosed out at the finish by a foot and placed second in the 440-yd. run, running the distance in 54.8 sec.
